GENERAL NEWS.

Leo Pinkus, a musician who was injured in the Ingot's theater fire, died February 15. He was the 57th victim.

Harry Cook, an Idaho sheepman, is under arrest at Stanford, Mont., for killing Joseph Vander, in a quarrel over a game of cards. Cook lost his money and then got a Winchester and "shot up" the house, killing Vander as he was crowding out of a rear door.

I. T. Steward, a smooth check grafter, has just worked Spokane business men for over \$200 by representing himself to be worth millions, and by paying his bills with checks which proved to be utterly worthless. He is now wanted by the police of that city.

AMERICANS IN MEXICO.

United States Consul Warns People to Make Haste Slowly.

American Consul A. J. Leppinase, at Tuxpan, Mexico, writes the following letter to the department of Commerce and Labor, for the benefit of people inquiring about Mexican opportunities:

"In reply to many letters received from professional men, clerks and mechanics in different parts of the United States, I deem it advisable to state that the first and all-important point for anyone wishing to settle in Mexico is to be able to speak the Spanish language, otherwise his chances of meeting with success are small.

"Although this may not apply with equal force to the farmer, who necessarily is not dependent to so great an extent as professional men and mechanics on a knowledge of the language in order to succeed, still, even to the farmer it is a very desirable acquisition. Furthermore, all who come to Mexico should have at least \$1,000 to \$2,000 gold.

"They will then be in a condition to investigate and study the people and country. At the first glance hundreds of apparently profitable opportunities present themselves to the new-comer, but if he is wise he will actually remain investigating for six months to familiarize himself with the commercial and social conditions which may exist where he proposes to locate.

"This may seem an exaggeration but even a year would be still more advantageous, if it were possible to remain idle that length of time. There is much on the surface that appears seductive, but hasty investments are generally disastrous.

"To this hundreds can testify who have plunged thoughtlessly into enterprises concerning which they had no previous experience or knowledge. Newcomers should make haste slowly, identify themselves with people of all classes, and nurse their capital in order to increase it a hundredfold. This is possible since ready money commands an enormous interest, when judiciously invested and protected by the valuable knowledge gained during the probationary period mentioned."—A. J. Leppinase, Consul, Tuxpan, Mexico.
