GENERAL NEWS.

There are 300 cases of typhoid fever in Watertown, N. Y., a city of 21,000 inhabitants.

Within 10 days flour has advanced 25 cents on the barrel in all parts of British Columbia.

Railroad traffic is almost completely tied up throughout North Dakota by heavy snows.

From 50 to 70 degrees below zero is the daily average at Dawson, Alaska, and points east, west and north of there.

F. A. Hyde, J. A. Benson, H. P. Dimond and J. H. Schneider have been indicted for timber land frauds by the federal grand jury at Washington.

The rebels of San Domingo attempted to capture the capital, San Domingo, by assault, and were repulsed with considerable loss, February 16.

Hummingbird gas had the start of electricity about 75 years. There are now in the United States four times as many electric light plants as gas plants.

In the United States are now burning, 25 years after Edison made electric lighting a commercial success, 40,000,000 incandescent lights and 800,000 arc lamps.

The saloons of Portland are organizing to fight the local option amendment which is to be voted upon in Oregon in June.

The Mint saloon at Baker City, was held up and robbed of \$150 by a lone highwayman, on Wednesday morning. There is no clue.

Joe Ferro and Jim Moleake, two Italian boys, attempted to wreck a Southern Pacific passenger train at Los Banos, Cal., Wednesday.

A. McAllister and R. Babcock were caught plundering box cars belonging to the O. R. & N. at Troutdale, on Wednesday, and are now in jail at Portland.

Seven passenger trains were blockaded in the Siskiyou on Wednesday, by three heavy snow and landslides on Wall creek, 20 miles south of Ashland.

A son of C. E. S. Wood, of Portland, was seriously injured in a runaway accident in the Black Forest, Germany, last week. The family is living in Germany at the present time.
