# WILL BUY AT HOME

## SHEEPMEN WILL MAKE SALT PURCHASES IN PENDLETON.

Representative of the Salt Trust Fails to Sell Stock Salt in Wholesale Lots—Home Merchants Will Be Patronized by Local Stockmen—Salt Now Quoted at \$14 to \$16 Per Ton With Prospects of a Reduction.

Douglas Belts, president of the Oregon Woolgrowers' Association, was in the city today, from his home near Pilot Rock and reports stock in that vicinity in good condition.

Mr. Belts thinks there will be a large amount of old hay left over this winter, owing to the remarkably open and mild winter. Sheepmen will have some reserve feed to begin on next winter, and hay will be more plentiful in the stock districts.

Speaking of the subject of salt for Umatilla county sheep, Mr. Belts thinks the sheepmen will unanimously agree that it is more profitable to purchase the salt used in this county from the home merchant than to order it from representatives of the salt trust, and be at the trouble and expense of unloading and storing it.

By purchasing it from home merchants, the sheepmen can take any quantity at a time, he may need, and save the cost of storage and the consequent loss from handling the salt two or three times, before it reaches the ranches.

Umatilla county uses about 250,000 pounds of stock salt per year for her sheep alone, and the price now runs from \$14 to \$16 per ton in this city, according to the quality.

A representative of the salt trust was in the county recently, endeavoring to sell the amount needed to Umatilla county sheepmen, in a wholesale lot, but the sheepmen have decided to purchase the supply as they need it from home merchants.

There is a flurry in the salt market just now, and Pendleton merchants expect to be able to effect a reduction from the prices quoted at this time.

It requires 200 pounds of salt per month for a band of 2,000 head of sheep.
