# CONVENTION OF ENDEAVORERS

(Concluded.)

Liston, of Salem; Charles Staver, Portland; Will Landrum, Union.

Field secretary—Rev. David Leppert, Huntington; Miss Alice Christian, Milton; Miss Alice Hutchinson, Portland; Rev. J. K. McGilvray, Grant's; Ed Mansfield, Portland.

Owing to the absence of Rev. J. O. Kust, of Seattle, who was to have preached the convention sermon, and who was detained at home on account of illness, Rev. E. S. Muckley, the pastor of the First Christian church of Portland, and recently of Honolulu, was introduced to make the address. He spoke from the theme found in Matthew xiv, 8: "And when they had lifted up their eyes, they saw no man save Jesus only," delivering a very powerful sermon.

At the close of the sermon the convention adjourned for the evening.

### Reports of Officers.

The first hour of the convention's time was given this morning to strictly devotional work, after which the reports of the officers of the state union, and of the representatives of the districts of the state were read.

The report of President Rockwood stated in part that the work of the state officers for the past year had been directed to the advancement of the district work. There are now organizations in every district in the state with the exception of the Pacific district (Coos and Curry counties) and the upper Columbia.

There have been quite a number of changes in the state executive committee since the Ashland convention. A. W. Brookings, of Portland, has been appointed assistant treasurer, Rev. Ferguson, of the citizenship and temperance work, has been called to the East to a church, and his place has been filled by Frank H. Mixsell, of Oregon City. Rev. A. E. Gardner, superintendent of the Christian Endeavor literature has resigned, and Miss Beula Henkle, of Philomath, has been appointed to the place.

Two new departments have been added: the devotional, with Rev. C. T. Hurd, of Salem, at the head, and the press, with W. A. Dill, of Portland, in charge.

### Oregon Banner Increase State.

A special feature of the work is the Advance campaign for increased membership, and Oregon is the first state in the Union to get an increase of 10 per cent, for which it was awarded the Chinese banner at the Denver convention. This banner will be granted for two years to the district which has made the biggest increase since June last, the presentation to be made on Monday next.

An invitation has been extended to the Young People's Alliance of the United Brethren church to affiliate with the Christian Endeavor, and it is thought by the end of the summer all of the societies will work in harmony with this order.

The state officers have been handicapped by a lack of funds, and would recommend every society to tax each member 10 cents each year for carrying on the state work.

The president called the attention of the convention to the value a field secretary for Oregon, Washington and California would be to the work, and asked the body to give the matter its consideration.

He also stated that there was a strong probability that the next international convention of the Christian Endeavor could be brought to Portland in 1907.

### Treasurer's Report.

H. S. Gile, the treasurer, submitted his report, which shows \$13.91 to have been balance on hand in June, 1902, after the Ashland convention. Since that time he has received in pledges \$234.90, and in personal contributions \$94.35, making a total of \$243.16.

The disbursements have been: Expenses advanced to officers, \$19.20; printing, \$107.82; miscellaneous, \$5.95; telegrams, \$1.90; postage, \$44.85; Rev. Eberman, \$80; advertisements, \$4.75. Leaving a balance on hand at this time of \$78.09.

The resources of the union are given as \$59.50, due on pledges not paid, and \$4 on personal contributions promised, making a total of \$63.50.

### Secretary's Report.

The report of the state secretary, Miss Martha Case, was read. It places the Christian Endeavor membership in the United States at 2,601,699. Since November, 1902, 3,186 new societies have been organized with an increase of from 20 to 3 per cent in 21 states.

In Alaska there are 37 societies; Canada, 4,947; Mexico, 111; West Indies, 250; Hawaii, 28; Philippines, 6; Australia, 3,960; Japan, 115; Korea, 12; China, 188; India, 5,000; Persia, 35; Turkey, 75; Africa, 141; Spain, 47; France, 96; Switzerland,

The approximate estimate of the members in the state is: Active members, 5,809; associate, 2,086; honorary, 945; junior, 3,828; intermediate, 1,212; making a total of 14,880.

The convention adjourned at noon, the afternoon being devoted to a worker's meeting.
