CALL REV. VAN NUYS

LA GRANDE MAN MAY BE PASTOR IN PENDLETON.

Local Church Will Formally Invite Him — Possibility That President Bleakney Will Resign — Academy Affairs More or Less Uncertain.

Rev. W. S. Holt, of Portland, returned yesterday evening from a trip to La Grande, and went this morning to Milton for a short visit, expecting to return this afternoon. This evening he will meet with the board of managers of Pendleton Academy, which will take up the discussion of the work of the school for the rest of this year and map out a plan of future work for the institution.

For some time there has been talk of President Bleakney resigning, but it is thought now that he can be persuaded not to do so and to remain here for the coming year.

It has been decided by the Presbyterian church that at their meeting to be held on Wednesday, a week from tomorrow a call be issued to Rev. W. L. Van Nuys, of La Grande, asking him to come to this city and take charge of the Presbyterian church.

Whether or not Mr. Van Nuys will accept is not definitely decided, but it is thought that he will, in which event Pendleton will secure one of the most prominent divines in the Eastern Oregon and Washington district.

The Irrepressible Conflict.

Washington, Feb. 23.—The supreme court today in the case from Alabama, involving the right of a negro to register, declined to take the case under consideration, on the ground that no cause for federal interference has been shown. This leaves the Alabama constitution, with its provisions against colored voters, still in effect.

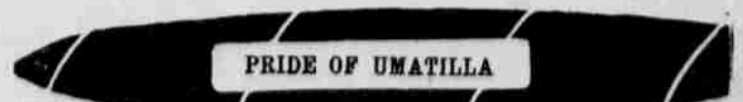
