MARKET REVIEWED

FARMERS ARE HOLDING ON TO THEIR WHEAT.

Armour's Actions Are Shady Just at Present—Wheatmen Are Wondering Whether He is Buying or Selling—Shortage in July Options Will Be the Next Attraction on the Pit.

Portland, Feb. 23.—The farmers and warehouse men are holding wheat tighter than ever, and the advance of May option to \$1.05 1/2 in Chicago did not make them sell any faster.

The wheat market in this city is quite different from the one in Chicago and other Eastern cities, inasmuch as the markets there are mainly speculative and the high prices of the past few weeks have not been occasioned by the larger demand for milling purposes.

In this city the demand always makes the price—the only outside markets causing any tendency in this market being Liverpool, which has not shown the large advances recently made in Chicago.

Just whether Armour is buying or selling now is the principal gossip among the traders. The indications are, however, that he is on both sides of the market, supporting the price when it threatens to become too weak and bearing it down when it tries to fly too far upward.

There seems to be a large shortage in the July option, and this one will probably be the center of attraction during the week. No changes today, owing to the holiday yesterday.
