Palmer Hall, the new science building of the Colorado State University, has just been dedicated. It is a \$250,000 structure.

Denmark and Holland have signed an arbitration treaty, and the machinery of European statecraft has permission to resume operations.

American and Chinese courts are wrestling with the property rights of children born in Hongkong (British) of an American father and Chinese mother.

Work on many of the Southern Oregon placer mines has been suspended on account of the high water.

Fred Walling, of Salem, died in awful agony from blood poisoning, Tuesday. It started from a slight scratch on his finger.

The Florence Crittenton Home, in Spokane, will be enlarged to be the largest institution in that system of asylums in the West.

A Russian Jew in Portland, only 29 years of age, has flowing white hair and beard and has the appearance of a man of 70 years old.

The nomination of L. T. Harris, of Eugene, for congress in the Willamette valley district, to succeed Binger Hermann, is now assured.

A grand jury will be called in Multnomah county during the coming term of circuit court for the purpose of investigating the gambling question.

Five suspicious characters, supposed to be the robbers who held up and robbed the Colonial Club of \$8,000 in San Francisco, last week, have been arrested in Marin county, California.

A new railroad is being surveyed in Wyoming from Orin Junction, on the Burlington, to Lander, in Western Wyoming. The length of the road will be over 200 miles and it is headed for the Pacific coast, ultimately.

Samuel Vinson, formerly United States district attorney, under President Cleveland, died in Virginia last Sunday. Vinson conducted the prosecutions against the A. R. U. and Coxey Army people in 1894, and was one of the most popular officials in the West.

## STATE PRESIDENT

### HEAD OF THE Y. P. S. C. E. IS A RAILROAD MAN.

J. A. Rockwood is a Graduate of Amherst, and a Former Teacher in Portland Academy—Has Been an Employee of the O. R. & N. for Several Years—Is Train Agent Out of Portland Eastward.

J. A. Rockwood, the president of the State Union of the Christian Endeavorers, is a young railroad man of Portland, and is an Oregon boy and former resident of Oregon City. His father was for many years pastor of the First Congregational church of Oregon City, and was the first Congregational state Sunday school missionary in the field.

Mr. Rockwood graduated from the Portland academy some years ago, and from there went to Amherst college, where he completed his education. Upon his return he accepted a position as one of the teachers of Portland academy, which place he filled for a couple of years, when his health giving way, he sought something that would allow him more relaxation and be less confining. He therefore went to work in the auditor's office of the O. R. & N., and was there for some time. When the company decided to put train agents on their passenger trains going out of Portland, they selected the men from the auditor's office, and in this way Mr. Rockwood came to be on the road, running out from the city to Bonnyville, near Cascade Locks, and back.

The duties of train agent are responsible, and the men who fill the places are chosen from those of the employees whom the management of the company can trust. The officers go out from Portland with the new trains and examine all of the tickets, noting them and correcting any irregularity that may appear. They complete their run in about 40 miles, and return to the city on the first train running in.

Mr. Rockwood likes his position, because it gives him an opportunity to meet many people, and opens for him a good avenue for the advancement of the cause which he represents. The field over which he passes in his daily round of duty is a fertile one for Christian endeavor, and he has many chances to advance the cause of the church, and of the Christian Endeavor movement.

## WOOD AT MEACHAM.

Over 2000 Cords in the Yards at the Present Time and No Sale for it.

S. G. Bryson of Meacham, is in the city today, in the interest of his wood business. He says there are over 2000 cords of wood on the dump at Meacham at this time, but that it is mostly owned by Eugene Tausiek of Walla Walla, and very little of this amount is for sale.

Mr. Bryson has formerly sold his wood to the retailers in this city and Walla Walla, but they decline to buy any more this year, and he will now ship his wood here, and sell direct to the consumer, from the cars.

Wood is selling at Meacham at \$3.25 per cord, which, with \$1.25 freight added, brings the total cost of four-foot cord wood to \$4.50 on the cars here.

## G. A. R. ENCAMPMENT.

Hood River to Welcome the Veterans in June.

The next state encampment of the G. A. R. will meet at Hood River on June 15, 16 and 17.

The citizens of Hood River were consulted in the matter and decided that the middle of June would be the most inviting time in that vicinity, and the committee of the order having the state encampment in charge, decided to call the meeting to suit the wishes of the city that is to act as host for the occasion.

The famous Hood River strawberry crop will be ripe at that time and the visitors will see this choice spot in Oregon in its choicest robes.

## Pacific Coast Wheat Crops.

The 1903 wheat crop of Washington was 19,586,345 bushels. This final estimate of the department of agriculture is believed to be accurate, and, so far as the government is concerned, it is the last word. The crop of 1902 was 23,672,187 bushels. The same authority gives Oregon's 1903 crop as 12,438,827 bushels; California's, 20,926,192; and Idaho's, 5,127,987.
