AMONG THE EXCHANGES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE

Faith in Franklin County.

W. B. Allen of Tacoma, who is in the city on business, thinks that irrigation for Franklin county is assured, and hints that the decision to carry out the Palouse river project has been about made by the government. Mr. Allen is an extensive land holder in Franklin county, his property lying west of Eltopia. He said yesterday:

"Southern Franklin county will be one of the richest and best sections in the West as soon as the government project is carried out, which does not seem destined to be long. Water will put it on the same basis as the Yakima valley—better, in fact as it is considerably earlier. Yes, I have considerable land in the southern half of the county, but it is all off the market now. It is no use letting land go for \$9 to \$10 an acre when it will be worth \$50 in a short time. A man can't turn his money over as fast as that."—Walla Walla Union.

Saved by Wagon Box.

Nicholas Owen, a prominent sheep man of the Upper Snake river country, had a narrow escape from drowning last Wednesday in the Snake river at a point a short distance below Lime Point. It seems that Mr. Owen was endeavoring to cross the slough at that point, which was deeper than expected on account of the recent rains. After driving out into the stream a considerable distance the water overflowed the wagon bed and it drifted from the running gears.

Owen then had a desperate struggle to reach the shore. He clung to the wagon bed and finally succeeded in drifting it to the shore, at a point about 200 yards below the point where the accident happened. After reaching the deep water the horses became entangled in the harness and

both were drowned.—Lewiston Tribune.

Cattle Disease in Yakima.

H. Baker, deputy state veterinarian, returned yesterday from the investigation of foot and mouth disease among the cattle of A. Baker, Goldendale, Klickitat county, whither he had been sent by the state veterinarian. The trip lasted two or three days.

Ten head of cattle were found to be afflicted with this disease, known technically as epizootic apthia, which is extremely contagious and infectious. The herd will be quarantined for about 30 days, and treatment was prescribed which in the ordinary run, is effective.—Walla Walla Statesman.

A La Pendleton.

Baker City has a Chinese noodle joint at which it is claimed that young boys are taught the opium habit.

Boys ranging in ages from 16 to 18 years frequent the place and day by day are acquiring the opium habit.

The evidence has not yet warranted an arrest, but the police have had their attention called to the matter and will either close the place or arrest young boys who are found there.—Baker City Herald.

Unique Industry at La Grande.

The La Grande Crescent Knitting Mills, the only factory of its kind in the Northwest outside of Portland, is arranging to double its capacity and has ordered a dozen new machines. The factory makes stockings, shawls and underwear. Suits of underwear are placed on the market all the way from \$2 to \$25 per suit and are manufactured of cotton, wool and silk. It is now impossible for the factory to fill all the orders coming in.—La Grande Chronicle.

Making Churches Sanitary.

An Italian bishop once sent out to the priests of his diocese the following circular:

1. In all churches, immediately after feast days on which there have been very large congregations, the floors must be disinfected by means of wood sawdust soaked in a one-tenth per cent solution of corrosive sublimate. On ordinary days they must be frequently swept, after sprinkling them with water so as to raise no dust.

2. Every week, and even oftener, the pews and confessionals must be cleaned with sponges and cloths moistened with pure water.

3. Every week, and oftener if necessary, the grills of the confessionals are to be washed and polished.

4. The holy water receptacles must be emptied every week, or oftener if necessary, and washed with hot water or a solution of corrosive sublimate.

That was a wise bishop, comments Medical Talk for March, who sent out the above order. But we would like to add one more item to it, namely, that after every service the church windows and doors shall be thrown wide open, and the pure, fresh outdoor air allowed to sweep through and through it, thoroughly cleaning it of the poisonous air and filling it with pure oxygen.

New Rate Schedule.

The local office of the O. R. & N. has received the schedule of rates for the World's Fair tickets during the St. Louis exposition. The round trip from Pendleton to St. Louis and return will be \$60; to Chicago and return will cost \$65.

On the round trip tickets to St. Louis and return by way of Chicago, no coupons will be sold, and the cost will be \$62.50.

There is a 10-day limit on the going time, or on the first end of the trip, which will give approximately a five-day layover at any point desired by the tourist, as the traveling time from here to St. Louis is about five days. The time limit on the ticket is 90 days, and on the last lap the traveler can use the full time in stopover privileges.

Tickets will be placed on sale in the Pendleton office during three days in the months of May, June, July, August and September each, though the exact days of the sale have not yet been decided.
