GENERAL NEWS.

M. Bunau-Varilla, Panama minister to Washington, has resigned.

Japan will have a very much larger and better exhibit at the World's fair than she had at Chicago in 1893.

China will have at St. Louis the largest and finest exhibit that ever left that country. It comprises 1,400 tons of material.

A New York street car conductor cut his finger slightly with a paper transfer slip. Blood poisoning set in and he died of lockjaw.

James Warden, aged 102 years, is dead in the Baltimore almshouse. He was a Methodist minister and was licensed to preach in 1824.

There are many indications that Austria and Russia will co-operate in affairs that may be contingent upon another uprising in the Balkans.

Admiral Uriu, of the Japanese navy, graduated from the United States Military Academy at Annapolis, in 1881. He stood 35th in a class of 71 members.

Homer Elliott, of Denver, now holds the world's record for individual bowling, having rolled 712 out of a possible 900. The highest previous score was 676.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Milwaukee is hustling for woolen mills, with a good prospect of securing them.

A sawmill employing 75 men, will begin operations at Warrenton, Clatsop county, March 12.

Jimmy Riley, of Portland, and Ed Krantz, of Seattle, both fly boxers, are matched for March 10 at Oregon City.

Sakutaro Hanosaka, a Seattle Japanese, has been sent to the penitentiary for a year for assaulting another Jap with a knife.

Doug Quay, an old Chinese woman, of Billings, Mont., was brutally murdered by beating February 26. Her husband is suspected.

Fernie, B. C., is said to have more fights and brawls than any other town in the Northwest—many more than some towns much larger.

Dr. C. C. Rosenberg, of Astoria, was February 26 acquitted of the charge of practicing medicine without a state license. It was a jury trial.

George Cruikshank, a well known miner of Chico, Mont., was killed by a snowslide—it is not known exactly what date, but presumably February 19. The body has not been recovered.

The bodies of W. J. Davis and Clair Elynn have been taken out of Crow's Nest coal mine in British Columbia, after being immured 18 months. There were 128 men killed in the mine.

T. S. Penton, a waiter, and Mrs. Adolph Michaelson, both of Seattle, have been arrested charged with conspiring to murder the woman's husband to get rid of him and to collect his life insurance.

W. P. Tierney, the well known railroad contractor, February 25 fell 40 feet sheer off a trestle, onto rocks. His only hurts were bruises, and two cuts on his face. The accident occurred in British Columbia.

THE STATE'S FARM

MORE HAY AND LESS
EXPERIMENTS WILL BE MADE.

Board Will Reach Its Ideal in Mr. Gammie's Management—Professor Leckenby Was Never in Harmony With the State Board of Managers—Best Seed for Sale—Grass Experiments Will be Continued.

The state farm at Union will be made the scene of activity this spring.

George Gammie, the new manager of the farm will introduce some individual plans and undertake to place the farm in a condition more suited to the tastes of the board of managers than it has been under the management of Professor Leckenby.

Professor Leckenby was a student and a scientist in the strictest sense of the word. He was also idealistic, and put many of his beautiful ideals into execution on the farm. He believed in flowers, in art, in strange and unique experiments and was capable of producing wonderful effects from soil and cultivation, and has made a unique and peculiar kind of progress there, that will never be made by Mr. Gammie and at the same time, Mr. Gammie will, perhaps make a practical advancement in the management of which Professor Leckenby was incapable.

Mr. Gammie is a practical farmer. He will raise good crops on the farm and will probably make it pay, from the standpoint of dollars and cents. But if the board and he are not careful it will drift back to the level of any other well regulated farm in Grande Ronde Valley, instead of remaining at the head of the farming industry in the state.

The board was dissatisfied with the scientific work of Professor Leckenby from the start, and wanted to make more hay and less experiments. But the state expended the money for the purpose of advancing the interests of agriculture and if no scientific work is done, the state might as well abandon the farm and quit spending the people's money upon it.

The soil is suited to almost any crop that grows in the temperate zone, and some vigorous experiments should be pursued there continually. The foundation for grass experiments laid by Professor Leckenby will be built upon by Mr. Gammie, and he will also further the dry land alfalfa experiments.

There are now several tons of fresh beet seed for sale and several kinds of new grass seed, which will some day prove valuable to Eastern Oregon. The elegant new barn, built at a cost of \$7,000, is complete and will contain nearly the entire output of the farm, aside from the hay crop.

Mr. Gammie invites the citizens of Eastern Oregon to visit the farm and learn how the experiments are carried on. He has not begun the spring work yet, because of the cold and unfavorable weather, but will make many repairs to fences and buildings during the idle time, before the seeding begins.

Another innovation to be introduced by Mr. Gammie is some stock feeding experiments. The state will furnish some blooded stock and experiments in breeding will be pursued as the facilities for handling the stock increases.
