REDEEMING A WASTE

OUTLINE OF WORK AT TONTO IRRIGATION PROJECT.

Over 400 Men Employed on Salt River Project in Arizona—Telephone Lines and Sawmill Operated by the Government to Facilitate Work—Foundations of Immense Cement Dam Now Laid.

L. C. Hill, the engineer in charge of operations at the Salt River basin, arrived at Phoenix yesterday morning from Globe, by rail, says a Phoenix, Arizona, paper. He expects to leave for the basin again about Tuesday, traveling overland and inspecting the telephone line now under construction.

Mr. Hill was applied to yesterday for information regarding the status quo of the cement question concerned in the storage enterprise. He said he had absolutely no knowledge of any change in former plans and has heard nothing except what he has seen in the papers. All he can say is that the work of building the plant at the basin is proceeding rapidly and there never has been any stopping of operations.

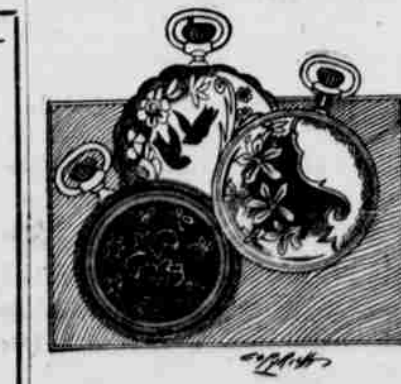
About 75 men are employed there now. There were a few more who were laid off at his instance for the reason only that he thought they could not be economically employed just at that time. But while the force was thus slightly reduced on that special work, the work itself was not delayed. The foundations of the mill are in and the building is now progressing.

Asked to give a general resume of what has been accomplished in the five months since the work actively began and how many men are actually employed, he gave a very interesting interview.

He says the force now is practically as large as it has ever been, yet not much larger than it has been for some time. There are approximately 290 men employed in the immediate vicinity of the storage basin, exclusive of those who are freighting in supplies, and cutting and sawing lumber in the mountains.

There are about 15 men at the saw mills, about 10 at Ad. Farish's surveying camp, about 30 at the cadastral survey camp of Mr. Hawley, south of Mesa, and about 40 at work on the telephone line. These, with the freighters between the basin and Globe, bring the total to about 490 men that are now, and have been for a long time, employed on work connected with the Tonto project in one way or another.

Reviewing what had been accomplished in the last five months, Mr. Hill said over 50 miles of road has been built, the foundations and part of the superstructure of the cement plant have been built, a brickyard and lime kiln have been established, water works have been constructed, piping water a distance of three miles, a saw mill has been built, surveys have been run for canals and general topographical surveys have been made and the telephone line is well on the way toward completion.

FIRST WEDDING IN FIVE YEARS.

Important Marriage to Be Solemnized in Westminster Abbey.

London, March 1.—The first marriage solemnized in Westminster Abbey since the wedding five years ago of the daughter of Lord Roseberry and the Earl of Crewe took place today when Lady Grisel Cochrane, the daughter of Lord and Lady Dundonald, became the wife of the Hon. Ralph Hamilton, Master of Belhaven and son of Lord and Lady Belhaven and Stanton. Notwithstanding the fact that this is Lent and that the marriage was solemnized therefore in defiance of the Rubric, the wedding was a most fashionable affair and largely attended. The bride was attended by 14 bridesmaids, who were attractively gowned in costumes of white chiffon and silver with pale green sashes and wreaths of snowdrops fastening tulle veils. A pretty feature of the bridal procession was the presence of Lord Uxington, the little grandson of Mrs. Bradley-Martin.

MIDNIGHT MUSIC

NEW ISSUE SPRUNG UPON THE COUNCIL.

Shall the Saloons Cease Their Piano Music at Midnight by the Orders of the Police, or Will They Be Permitted to Continue as Long as They Please?—Council Will Consider the Matter Wednesday Night.

On Wednesday evening when the city council convenes, it will have to consider, among other things, the question as to whether or not the saloons will have the right to run pianos or other musical instruments after midnight, and to fix the limit.

The discussion has been brought up by a misunderstanding which took place a few nights ago in the Baker & Garrison saloon between Deputy Marshal Scheer and John Garrison, one of the proprietors of the saloon.

It has been the custom of the saloons to close their music at the request of the city marshal, at an hour set by him. Under Marshal Carney the time has been placed at midnight, and when Mr. Scheer went into the Baker & Garrison saloon shortly after that time and asked the proprietor to stop the piano, there was trouble. Mr. Garrison ordered the marshal out, and it looked for a time as though there would be trouble, but it simmered into talk. Mr. Scheer left the place and the piano stopped.

Wednesday evening both sides will appear before the city council, and it is up to that body to say whether or not the saloons have the right to run their music as long as they please, or whether they will have to obey the request of the officers.

REPORT OF CONVENTION.

Official Proceedings of the 11th National Congress Now Out.

The official proceedings of the 11th National Irrigation Congress have just been issued by Gilbert McClurg, director of publicity department of the National Irrigation Association, of Colorado Springs.

The volume contains about 500 pages and numerous views and photographs of prominent places and persons, besides all the articles, debates, papers and addresses heard at the convention.

Many of the scientific papers by government experts were not read during the official proceedings and will, therefore, be new to the delegates who were present.

A brief address on the "Relation of Internal Commerce to Irrigation," by T. G. Hailey of this city, appears in the proceedings, and also an able review of the prospects of irrigation in Oregon by John T. Whistler. The volume can be secured from Gilbert McClurg, Colorado Springs, Colorado.
