Wheat Reports From Walla Walla. Milton Evans, state correspondent for the department of agriculture, will today forward his report for the Walla Walla valley, showing condi-tions at the close of February. The report shows that all the corn raised last year was of a marketable quality and the price averaged about 0 cents per bushel. Mr. Evans estimates that 25 per cent of the wheat crop of last year is still in the hands of the farmers and that one per cent is annually consumed within the county. The corn crop of the county is shown to be of but little importance, although enough is raised to supply local demands.-Walla Walla

Green sheep pelts are selling for 5 cents, and the dry for 7 while green beef hides are bringing cents, and 11 cents dry. This will show the market to be falling, and though the supply is short, the de-

mand seems to be very weak. The local men in the business have but little to do, and have a hard time in finding pelts enough to justify the
