Wronged Man Wins.

When Mrs. William Baker skipped with her paramour, Walker, she took along \$800, which she checked out of the First National Bank. Baker through his attorney, C. A. Johns, subsequently made a demand for the money, which was refused. Suit was then instituted in the circuit court, and came up for trial before Judge Eakin and a jury last Saturday. The defense set up the claim that she was Baker's authorized agent, and had been given the right by him to check against his bank accounts. Evidence to that effect was introduced. It was controverted by the plaintiff in so far as this particular deposit was concerned. The jury evidently took the plaintiff's view of the contention, for, at shortly before midnight on Saturday, they returned a verdict in his favor.

The case will probably be appealed.—Sumpter Reporter.

Snow Crushes Roofs.

During the last few weeks many of the property owners who have flat roofs have permitted the snowfall to accumulate on their property, and now they are suffering the natural consequences. As the result of one of the oversights on the part of one of the property holders, there was a cave of the roof of the building back of the Magnolia saloon the other evening, which resulted in the demolishing of quite a large number of bar fixtures that had been stored there. The entire roof on the north side was coated with ice, and to cut it away it was found necessary for two men to go up and, using a hatchet in hand, one of them let down by a rope

Portage is Delayed.

Mr. Smith said the farmers of Gilliam county were disappointed because the state board had made the portage road proposition a secondary matter and had not pursued a more diligent course in securing a right of way for the portage. He said Gilliam county farmers had hoped the portage could have been completed in time to handle this year's wheat crop, so that better rates could have been secured. WHEAT PRICES TOO HIGH FOR THE EXPORTERS.

Portland Millers Occupy the Field Alone—Premiums Are Being Paid Over Printed Quotations in Order to Get Sufficient Supply for the Mills This Season.

Portland, March 3.—The price of wheat in this market has reached a state when it is so high that exporters cannot make any buys in the field is left entirely to the millers. The latter class is now well stocked with supplies and none of them are very anxious to buy at present prices.

Those who were short a short time ago and were paying a premium over the printed quotations for immediate supplies have now withdrawn their orders and are only willing to pay the market values and are not very firm at those figures.
