GENERAL NEWS.

The World's Fair managers have settled their trouble with the striking laborers, 1,000 of whom returned to work March 4.

There will be no Hawaiian exhibit at the World's Fair. The appropriation will be diverted, as the territory is hard up.

A college of domestic science will be established at the University of Chicago, April 1, under the direction of Miss Marion Talbot.

Michael Cudahy, the millionaire packer of Omaha, has been taken to a Pasadena, Cal., sanitarium, dangerously ill with mastoiditis.

There have been inquiries from Guayaquil, Ecuador, about Alberta lands and opportunities lately, of the Vancouver, B. C., immigration bureau.

The gross receipts of the Southern Pacific railway during 1903, amounted to \$96,833,436, of which \$88,229,235 were for transportation charges.

Harry Payne Whitney will not sell off the racing stock of his father, William C. Whitney, deceased, but keep the stable—the finest in America—intact.

Rev. Russell H. Connell, D. D., pastor of the Baptist Temple at Philadelphia, has declared the modern church is dying because of the indifference of pastors and congregations.

The mains conducting natural gas fuel to Cleveland, Akron and other Northern Ohio towns were badly damaged by the recent floods, resulting in much suffering and inconvenience.

In a congressional fight over the District of Columbia appropriation bill, Bartlett, of Georgia, referred to the telephone system of the district as a "drastic monopoly." He was not disputed.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

A new grange was organized at Fairview Friday, with a membership of 135.

Judge J. A. Savage, one of the pioneer lawyers and a former member of the Nevada legislature, died at Livingston, Mont., Friday, where he had resided for 30 years.

J. W. Bailey, pure food commissioner of Oregon has been appointed a member of the pure food congress, which will convene in St. Louis during the exposition, this year.

Circulars have been sent out to the various fraternal orders of the Northwest, asking them to take part in the erection of a fraternal building at the Lewis and Clark fair.

Mike Mulich, an Austrian, while testifying in the trial of Martin Blatnich, for the murder of Joseph Stukal, at Butte, Friday, admitted that he, and not Blatnich, killed Stukal in self-defense.

The O. R. & N. company has filed a suit to libel the Grace Dollar, a steamer, foundered outside of the bar, in order to proceed with the rescue of the vessel and secure the salvage for recovering the property.

Woodson Gray, who killed Archie Halgarth, at Elgin, last October, and who has been sentenced to the penitentiary for seven years, on a second trial, is out on \$7,000 bail, pending a hearing of his application for a new trial.

The carpet first placed on the floor of the Olympia Masonic lodge, 52 years ago, and believed to be the oldest carpet in the Northwest, has just been removed and cut into souvenir strips for the members. The Olympia Masonic Temple is the oldest lodge building north of the Columbia river.
