SCHOOL EXPANSION COUNTY

BONDS OR NO BONDS

IS THE ISSUE AGAIN

High School Can Be Continued in Operation Without Interruption-Possible Agreement in Sight Un der Which a Building and Refunding Bond Proposition Can Be Carried Without Serious Opposition.

The school board held a meeting and important business was transacted. The board has been waiting for several days to hear from State Superintendent Ackerman on the status of the Pendleton high school

Professor Ackerman holds that the school can be continued under present management, and that changes are necessary in the corps of teachers or in the management of the school in any way. He holds that the high scaool was not formed, strictly speaking, according to the law, and therefore the technicalities of the law are not applicable to it, which fact removes any contention over the qualifications of any teacher, and allows the board to employ teachers at their discretion. The school will therefore be continued under its present plan.

For Another Bond Election. It was decided to ask once more the issuance of bonds to build and to refund the floating debt of the district. John Hailey, Jr., was directed to secure sufficient names to empower the board to call an election, and he finished his work this afternoon. At a meeting this even-ing the board will further discuss

the question and issue the call. It was decided to ask for \$30,000 bonds with which to provide for the construction of a new building, and for the refunding of the floating debt of the district. This debt is at this time about \$14,500, which would leave about \$15,500 for the construction of the building

Irrepressible Issue.

This action of the board opens once more the old question which agitated the minds of the citizens last year about this time. The board then asked for bonds to build, and the request was turned down at the polls, principally through the efforts of a few influential men. This year they have the same ideas on the question, but they say it is not the bonds, but the location of the proposed building that causes the trou-They were not in favor of the purchase of the old Academy buildings, and still think that site a poor place for the construction of a permanent school building. It is inclosed in a network of tracks and is in the manufacturing center of the city If these objections were overcome and the district could secure other and better lots for the building, the opposition would be among the first

to rally to the issuance of the loan. If an attempt is made to issue bonds on the same platform as last year, it will be a hard fight. If the issue can be arbitrated and an ante election agreement reached on es sentials, the bonds will carry by a

WITH TRIBUNE'S BILL

Many of the Items Advertised Are Much Less Than Cost of Publishing-Entire Bill Is Honeycombed With Graft-Court Does Not Know How Much to Cut Out Yet.

The county court met this morning to audit the bills now remaining. After tackling a few of the items returned for the running expenses last night at which some interesting of the county the court came to the bill submitted by the Morning Tribune for printing done during the last two months, which includes the printing of the delinquent tax list.

The bill for the tax list called for 237 inches at \$2.60 an inch, making a total of \$616.20, which, taken with the other printing done, brings the total amount asked for at this sion of the court to \$734.60. After taking a good look at the bill the court took a recess. This afternoor tiev met again and are investigating the bill.

The detailed statement of the costs of the delinquent tax list shows some interesting things. One, and the principal one, is that the costs for advertising exceeds cases the amount of the tax due. For instance, the tax assessed to Mrs. Nettie Adams amounted to \$1.65, and the costs of advertising to \$2.15; in the case of E. H. Adams the tax was 3 cents and the cost 50 cents; W. L. Alcorn, tax \$1.40, costs, \$2.15; J. P. Bushee estate tax, 16 cents, costs 75 cents; Aura M. Butler tax 4 cents, costs 75 cents; and so on to the end of the list.

Taking one place in the list sub-mitted, it would have been possible to cut out 15 lines had the list been set with correct abbreviations. From court is bothered, not with the ques tion of throwing some of it out, but as to what proportion of the whole list should be consigned to the wastebasket.

At the end of the session this afternoon the court will adjourn until Monday, when consideration of the Wild Horse road will be taken


