GENERAL NEWS.

A 1,000-ton vessel will carry a \$60,000 cargo of Alaskan codfish.

The government of Peru has secured a loan of \$3,000,000 in the United States.

Within eight months 36 people have committed suicide in San Francisco with illuminating gas.

Much difficulty is being experienced getting a jury for the second trial of Mrs. Cordelia Botkin at San Francisco.

Jockey George Odom will ride the season of 1904 for James R. Keene, for \$15,000, and two and one-half per cent of winnings.

Congressman Geo. W. Craft of Aiken, S. C., is dead at home from blood poisoning originating in a splinter in his thumb.

During the past two weeks 10,000 home-seekers have passed through Chicago headed for Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas and the Southwest in general.

Six laborers were riding in a car laden with gasoline near Harrisburg, Pa. One of them struck a match to light his pipe, and now four are dead and two badly burned.

Two companies of the Fifth U. S. cavalry have been ordered to march overland from Fort Logan, Colorado to Fort Apache and Huachuca, Arizona, a distance of 1,600 miles.

The 500 members of a religious sect on Beal's Island, near Jonesport, Me., are developing maniacal proclivities very similar to those of the Holy Rollers of Corvallis, Ore.

The plan to establish a very large drill and parade ground for regular army maneuvers near New York city, has been abandoned on account of the exorbitant prices asked for land.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Matthew Higgins, an aged logger, was instantly killed by attempting to jump on the fender of a street car at Vancouver, B. C., Thursday.

The total number of voters now registered in Portland is 14,500, or 1,000 less than at this time last year. It is expected that 25,000 voters will be on the books by May 15.

H. J. Hughes, a man aged 65, who has been missing from his room in Portland for several days, is supposed to have been murdered. He had \$165 on his person when last seen.

The police commissioners of Portland have ordered the city jail fumigated every week hereafter, to prevent disease, as several cases of sickness have recently developed there.

Mrs. Fritz Myers of Vancouver, B. C., dragged her little stepson to a red-hot stove and pressed his hands on the lids, until they were almost roasted, for some trivial offense, Thursday.

The city council of Ballard, Washington, has passed an ordinance forbidding liquor drummers to go from house to house, in canvassing for orders. Wine salesmen from Seattle became so numerous that the ordinance was passed in self-protection.

The United States court at Spokane has forbidden union pickets at charitable institutions. The unions have been boycotting a cheap restaurant, patronized by the miserably poor, because the restaurant could not afford to pay union wages, at the prices at which meals were served.

PENDLETON LEADS

MANY MERCHANTS MEET HERE TO ORDER SUPPLIES.

Walla Walla, La Grande, Heppner, Milton, Adams, Athena, Weston and Helix Were All Represented Here Yesterday Evening — Dry-goods Salesman Makes Pendleton Central Distributing Point.

As an evidence of the business importance of Pendleton, it is only necessary to mention a meeting of merchants from surrounding towns which was held here yesterday afternoon.

Representative merchants from La Grande, Walla Walla, Heppner, Athena, Milton, Echo, Weston and Helix come here by appointment, to meet a salesman from an eastern dry goods house, and order their summer goods, in wholesale lots.

Pendleton being centrally located was selected as the meeting point for these merchants, to save the expense and delay of having the drummer visit all the different cities and take separate orders.

The samples were displayed here yesterday afternoon, and the different merchants for 75 miles around Pendleton met and looked over the stock, and ordered their entire summer supplies, in bulk which will be shipped in bulk from the house in the east.

There are three points at which these merchants' meetings are held, for the purpose of ordering large quantities of goods, in the entire Northwest.—Portland, Spokane, and Pendleton, and after these orders are placed, the different railroads begin a scramble for the shipments.

As the interior country settles up, the number of merchants joining in these combination orders becomes larger and larger and within a few years, this gathering will become a special feature in the autumn, winter and spring in this city.

The drummer with whom this meeting was held, carries about 20 of the largest sample trunks and his baggage resembles a theatrical troupe coming to town. The merchants get reduced prices by ordering in combination lots and the drummer saves the great expense of carrying his baggage over a large territory, to make all the outlying towns represented.
