A KNITTING PLANT

ELECTRICITY IS THE ONLY FACTOR LACKING.

Given Electric Power, Pendleton Would Have a Knitting Plant Employing Fifty People, in Operation in Time to Work up the Next Crop of Wool—Eastern People of Capital and Responsibility are the Projectors.

If Pendleton could supply electricity enough for a large manufacturing plant, it could have a branch of one of the largest knitting plants in the United States inside of a few months.

J. P. Kelliher of this city, has been looking into the conditions here for several days, having been asked by one of the largest woolen mills in Massachusetts of the prospects here, and finds that the prospects are not as bright as could be wished for the establishment of the plant.

The mill people want to put a plant in the west where it will be easily accessible to a large wool supply, and at which can be produced all the woolen hosiery needed to supply the western trade, and if possible a share of the eastern.

It is the desire of the managers of the scheme to build a factory here large enough to work 50 operators at the outset, and to knit woolen stockings for the trade. The wool would be bought direct from the growers, thus enabling the factory people to pay a good price for the raw material, and if the power could be secured the work would be begun at once on the construction of the building, and all would be in operation in time to use the first of the wool clip of the present year.

The whole scheme hangs fire on the power proposition. Dr. Vincent, the manager of the Northwestern Gas and Electric Company, says his company will not be in a position to furnish power before the middle of October, which would be too late. The present capacity of the Pendleton Electric Company is now overtaxed, so there is no hope of the new company getting any help from the electric people. As the machinery will have to be run by electricity, it seems that the plan will necessarily be dropped for the time, at least.

If some plan can be arranged whereby the company can get power, it is very probable that the plant will be put in at an early date; but if no power can be furnished, Pendleton will lose this chance. It is a certain thing that the company would put the plant here if it could get the power.

MUSICAL EVENT.

Tonight's Performance at the Presbyterian Church.

Prof. LaConte, the pianist, has promised to play at the Presbyterian church musical social tonight, and the finest piano in the city has been placed for his use. How many numbers he will execute, and what they will be, cannot be told until the close of the evening, as his part in the entertainment is supplementary to the regular program, and only secured by solicitation and the promise that he could have the use of a first-class instrument.

The regular program has been prepared with great care, and will be rendered to the last detail as originally arranged and participated in by the best local talent, both musical and elocutionary. Prof. LaConte's part will not be an interruption, nor yet an amendment to the program. It will be outside of it—that much more than the committee was able to promise the public before securing his services.

As a special favor to the church people the management of the Scott Music House insisted upon postponing the musical at their parlors when they learned that Prof. LaConte was wanted by the church people. The music house musical will take place some evening early next week.
