The prisoner demurred to the arrest, claiming to be a merchant at Athena. He had a check book from the Savings Bank of this city, in which he showed a large account, and was identified as a prominent citizen of Athena. He was turned loose and now Henderson claims that he is in about the same fix, and will be able to prove his innocence. He is now in the city jail.
