STUBBLEFIELD WILL CASE.

Famous Controversy Will Have a Hearing in Umatilla Courts.

The famous long drawn out Stubblefield will contest has been brought to this county, after having exhausted the patience and knowledge of the Walla Walla probate court, and having been dismissed by it. Cassana Stubblefield now asks that she be settled in the Umatilla county court, claiming that the property is all in this county and that therefore Umatilla courts have jurisdiction.

According to the petition filed Judge Hartman yesterday afternoon filed an order directing that C. M. Rader, R. M. Dorothy and E. A. Reser to produce in court, inside of ten days, the original will, together with an inventory of the property of the estate. The estate consists of \$3,500 of real property and of about \$200,000 personal property. The contest is over a codicil to the will providing for the endowment of a home for orphans and elderly women, which it has been decided to locate at Walla Walla.

FOR EASTER SERVICES.

All the Churches Will Hold Special Services on That Day.

The churches are now busy with their preparations for Easter observances, and some very interesting services will be held in the city on Easter Sunday.

Prof. E. Ray Jones is drilling a chorus of about 25 voices for the services at the Methodist church, and there will be other features prepared

for the day, that will make the services of the Methodist church very interesting.

All of the churches will prepare special services for the day, consisting of music and other exercises arranged for the day. The decorations of some of the houses will be elaborate, the work having been given into the hands of committees which will spare no effort to make their work show the advent of spring in all its beauty.

REVIVAL WILL CLOSE.

Christian Church Meetings Will Be Discontinued Tomorrow Night.

There were five additions to the Christian church last night and five baptisms, and the meetings will continue tonight and tomorrow night, but the revival will close with the meeting tomorrow night.

Rev. Brooks will preach on a "Change of Heart" tonight, at which time several have signified their intention of joining with the church.
