WILL PROBABLY GO ON A STRIKE TOMORROW.

The Union Refuses to a Certain Ar bitration Plan Submitted to Them, Claiming That Arbitration Never Comes Their Way - Only an Eleventh-Hour Compromise Can Prevent a General Lockout, or Going Out of Lithographers All Over the Country.

New York, March 14. - After a series of futile conferences between the employing lithographers of the country and representatives of the various unions in the trade, 10,000 skilled workmen in the United States and Canada will be locked out tomorrow morning unless the elev-enth-hour settlement is reached, and this is not expected.

For several years there have been serious differences between the employers and their workmen, the history of the conflict being very similarly from 17. Judd building. ployers and their workmen, the hislar to the disputes between the builders and their brought on the big strike in New York last spring,

So serious did those troubles interfere with the business of the employing lithographers that they suspended work in some places and etc. much of the business went abroad. Both employers and employes have

strong national organizations and an arbitration agreement

which all disputes would be settled without strikes or lockouts. A letter to this effect was sent to the unions throughout the United States and Canada. Before the unions themselves, however, could consider the proposition the presidents of the international associations took matter up and formed an offensive and defensive alliance to oppose the

Then the employers issued an ulti did condition. Eight lots, good barn matum, informing the unions that unless the arbitration plan was signed by March 15 by the various unless representatives of the unions they would no longer deal with them as unions, but would require each member of a union to sign the agreement as an individual before he would be allawed to work. A final conference was held but nothing was accomplished.

The chief objection to arbitration on the part of the union men are that it is contrary to the constitutions of some of the unions, that arbitration usually operates against the work-ingman and that many questions, such as the open or closed shop cannot or should not be submitted to arbitration. The employers contend that they are simply seeking scability in trade conditions, and that they are willing to arbitrate any difference that may come up
