BIG SHEEP SALE.

J. E. Smith Sells 10,000 Head of Lambs in Chicago.

J. E. Smith returned yesterday from a two months' stay in Nebraska and Chicago, where he went to dispose of the flock of 10,000 lambs, which he had been feeding since fall near Kearney, Neb.

The lambs had been on feed for 140 days when he began to sell, and had gained on an average 30 pounds since shipping them from the ranges of this county.

Mr. Smith sold all of his sheep to the firm of Clay Robinson & Co., of Chicago, one of the largest firms in that city, and made a good profit off the deal. By shipping them as he did and feeding them at the other end of the line, he saved all of the shrinkage that usually accompanies such shipments, and really gained in weight and consequent profit.

The sheep were all under a year old, and had been raised by Mr. Smith on the land of the J. E. Smith Livestock Company, and were the first grade of mutton sheep.

AFFAIRS OF SCHOOL

TOTAL REGISTRATION
OVER ELEVEN HUNDRED.

Average Daily Enrollment is Nine Hundred and Ninety-one — Very Large Increase in the Attendance in the High School — General Health of Pupils is Excellent — Work in All Departments is Going Along Smoothly.

From statistics compiled by Professor Conklin, city superintendent, it is shown that the total registration of the public schools has been 1,119 for the year. The largest attendance on any one day was 1,072, while at present there are 991 pupils in daily enrollment and attendance. The falling off is due to the fact that some are sick, some have moved away with their parents, and some have left school for the work of the farm, or other situations.

When school convened last fall there were 88 enrolled in the high school, and by the holidays the number had increased to 100. At this time there is an average attendance in the high school of 115, the largest in its history.

There are 21 rooms in the city, with 24 teachers over them, and an average of 51 pupils to the room. Last month the average daily attendance in each room was 47. In several of the rooms, however, the seating capacity is from 31 to 35, which throws the other rooms much above the average number.

The health of the pupils has been good during the year, but very few cases of serious disease being reported, and in most of those cases the pupils are now in school again. While the sanitary conditions are not what they should be in some of the rooms on account of overcrowding and poor arrangement, the teachers by a constant fight have been able to handle them in such a manner as to overcome the tendency to bad air resultant from faulty ventilation, and have combated the tendency to sickness faithfully and successfully.

The work has been a success, all of the teachers having their rooms well in hand, and the progress made in the course of study has been gratifying alike to parent, teacher and pupil.

ADJUDGED INSANE.

Smith, Who Attempted Suicide, Is of Unsound Mind.

Upon the complaint of his brother, J. B. Smith, of La Grande, H. C. Smith was today examined by the county court and adjudged insane. He will be taken to the asylum tonight or in the morning, by Sheriff Taylor.

Smith is the man who attempted suicide at La Grande some three weeks ago by cutting his throat with a razor and slashed his wrists. He is an Englishman, 43 years of age, and was born in London. His occupation is that of a sawmill man, and his residence is given as Cold Springs, Mo.

The cause of his insanity is given as melancholy. Smith came to this country some time ago and had been living at the home of his brother, who is a conductor on the O. R. & N. His melancholy and attempt to suicide is supposed to have been caused by disappointment and unsuccessful mining speculations. He is now practically recovered from his wounds, and was thought to be able to return to his home in a few days, until mental derangement was noticed.

CANNERY IN DIFFICULTY.

Suit Will Be Filed to Recover for Material Furnished by the Echo Land and Lumber Company.

A suit will be filed in a short time against the Echo Cannery and Cold Storage Company by the Echo Land and Lumber Company, to recover a sum of money due for material used in constructing the buildings belonging to the cannery.

W. H. Boyd and Charles Bartholomew, directors of the cannery company, were in the city today. These gentlemen are the principal owners in the cannery at this time, and will probably take up the account of the Land and Lumber Company, against the cannery, and bid the property in at the sale, if the suit for materials is pushed.

H. C. Willis, who was formerly manager of the cannery, and who sold out recently, holds a mortgage of \$2,000 on the property, but this claim of the material man precedes his mortgage, and it is therefore likely that the mortgage will be set aside and the property sold to satisfy the claim for material.

J. H. SUMMERS DEAD.

Passed Away Yesterday From Effects of Pneumonia.

J. H. Summers died yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock at his home near the hospital, after a short illness of pneumonia. The deceased was about 58 years of age and leaves a wife and several small children. He has been a resident of this city for some time. The funeral will be conducted tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Catholic church, the services being conducted by Father Van Der Velden.

Switch Engine Off Track.

The Spokane train due here last night at 5:35 did not arrive until after 10 o'clock, owing to a switch engine having run off the track in the Spokane yards, just ahead of the train, and penning it in until the derailed engine could be replaced on the track.

Miss Alice Peters, of This City, Becomes Mrs. Elmer Wills Tomorrow.

Miss Alice Peters, one of the well known and favorite young women of Pendleton, will be married tomorrow noon, at Portland, to Elmer Wills, of that city.

The young couple will arrive in Pendleton on Thursday evening, for a few days' visit, when they will return to Portland, where they will make their permanent home. Miss Peters has been a resident of this city all her life and numbers her friends by the hundreds, all of whom will regret to know that she will leave here to make Portland her home.

The wedding comes as a surprise to her friends.

LAND FRAUD HEARINGS.

Col. J. H. Raley Believes All Those Under Indictment Will Be Acquitted.

Col. James H. Raley left this morning for Portland, where he will look after the legal interests of some of the men whose cases will come up before the federal grand jury in the land fraud cases.

In the estimation of Mr. Raley the jury will hold all of the men whose cases are brought before it, but when the time comes for trial he believes all of them will be acquitted.

EXAMINING VOLUNTEERS.

Special Pension Agent Here in the Interest of Spanish War Claims.

J. H. Himes, a special agent of the pension department from Spokane, is in the city today for the purpose of making an examination into the claims of applicants for pensions among the volunteers of the Spanish war.

One of the special cases to be examined into is that of Otto Didion, a Spanish war volunteer, whose hearing was permanently injured by the heavy cannonading.

Hartman, and left on the morning train for Seattle, where they will visit for a time before returning to this city to make their home.
