WILL HAILEY SERVE?

IS STRONGLY URGED TO TAKE NOMINATION AGAIN.

Large Business Interests Cause Him to Hesitate Before Making Race for District Attorney Again—The Church People Anxious for Him to Keep Up the Fight Against Gambling—Will Support Him Regardless of Party, if He Will Run.

The office of district attorney for Morrow and Umatilla counties is one of the most important offices to be filled at the coming election, and more people are inquiring about possible candidates for this office than about any other.

Owing to the extreme economy with which T. G. Hailey has conducted this office during his term, and owing to his firm and uncompromising attitude on the gambling question, he has a large and enthusiastic following in all the parties, and has the solid support of the church people, who have expressed their hearty approval of his action in more than one way.

Mr. Hailey has large private interests, which he must attend to, and he is undecided yet as to his action in accepting another nomination, and until he makes his intention known, this office will be the chief storm center around which the greatest political activity will be found.

During Mr. Hailey's term he has won every suit in which the county has been concerned. Owing to his advice and counsel, a great deal of costly litigation has been avoided and the county expenses materially reduced.

His action in enforcing the law against gambling has met with especially warm approval from the church people and moral element of all parties, and they are desirous of seeing Mr. Hailey continue in office and pursue his campaign against this evil, as district attorney, until it is entirely stamped out in this vicinity.

While there are new men who would probably fill the office as gracefully, they say Mr. Hailey is in the harness and has the matter at his fingers' ends, and they would rather see him continue for another term at least.

John McCourt is mentioned as a possible republican candidate, and as Mr. McCourt is associated with Judge J. J. Balleary, one of the ablest lawyers in the state, his friends argue that he would make a good prosecuting attorney, but his attitude on the gambling issue is not definitely known to the church people and they prefer to keep a man in the office for another term, whose position on this important question is known, rather than to risk a new man, even though his politics may be more to their liking.

Strong pressure is now being brought to bear upon Mr. Hailey, from the best people in the county, from all parties, to continue in this race, and it is thought that he will accept the nomination. The church people fear that a man openly favoring gambling may creep in, if a tried man is not supported by all those in favor of moral discipline in the city, and as the city council favors gambling, the church people would lose all they have gained in the past two or three years.

With a vigorous man in this office, they argue, the evil will be so completely under control, within a year or two more, that public sentiment will then be absolutely against open gambling, and the efforts of the active moral forces in the community, will have borne good results.

TRADE OPENINGS IN TURKEY.

American Consul at Erzerum Tells of High Opportunities There.

American Consul E. J. Sullivan at Erzerum, Turkey, writes as follows on openings for American trade in that country:

"The city of Trebizond is, one of the most important cities and ports in the Black Sea. It is about 480 miles from Constantinople and 100 miles from Batum. It is besides its own trade and that of the Province of Trebizond, the port of entry and distributing center for the interior, viz: Erzerum, Bitlis, and Van, and the caravan route for Persia. The population of the province is estimated at 1,193,000 and that of the city at 50,000.

There is a splendid opening for the sale of the following American goods: Stoves, furniture, agricultural implements, canned goods, shoes, mechanics' tools, linens, cottons, flannels, silks, prints, pictures and picture frames, lamps, tinware, tin plates, galvanized ware, paints, varnishes, optical supplies, window blinds, oilcloths, linoleum, rain coats and mackintoshes, water filters, coolers and house refrigerators, safes, pianos and organs, knitting machines, typewriters, rubber hose, rubber overshoes, silver-plated ware, patent medicines, clocks and watches, etc.

Catalogues, illustrated or otherwise, are valueless. The merchants pay no attention to them, as they do not understand our currency, weights, measures, or prices.

I have made a very careful study of business conditions in this country. My experience and training in commercial life affords me an exceptional opportunity to speak from the standpoint of a practical business man, and I have no hesitation in stating that a most excellent opportunity presents itself to American manufacturers to control the market.

From personal experience and observation I have found that the retail

In the absence of some merchant who would start branch stores, the sending of commercial travelers with samples is the most practical method of securing orders. There is no question or doubt of the great opportunities that present themselves and it is to be hoped such a fruitful market will attract the attention of our manufacturers.

I am in constant receipt of requests, personal and otherwise, from Trebizond merchants asking that the manufacturers of the United States seriously consider the opportunity that presents itself for trade and commerce in Asia Minor."

HEALTH OFFICERS

FROM ALL OVER THE STATE WILL MEET MARCH 22-23.

Will Consider and Discuss Sanitary Issues in Every Phase: Water Supply, Dairies, Drainage, School Hygiene, Etc., Etc.—Dr. C. J. Smith Will Discuss Observance of the Law Requiring Returns of Vital Statistics.

The county and city health officers of the state will meet in Portland March 22 and 23, under the auspices of the state board of health, for consideration of the various sanitary questions that affect the modern city, and with which the health officer of the present day is expected to deal.

The program to be rendered is as follows:

Tuesday at 2 p. m., "Peculiarities and Diagnosis of Present Smallpox Epidemic." Discussion opened by Dr. C. J. Fagan, secretary of provincial board of health, Victoria, B. C. Dr. Sanford Whiting, Dr. Herbert Cardwell, Dr. James C. Zan, all of Portland, and Dr. Walter C. Cullin, of Coquille City, will also speak on the subject.

Tuesday evening, an address by Hon. W. W. Cotton, entitled, "The Sanitation of the Dairy." Discussion opened by Dr. S. B. Nelson, president of the state board of health of Washington, and Mr. Richard Scott, of Milwaukee.

Wednesday, beginning at 10 a. m., "Typhoid Fever and Water Supply." Dr. Elmer E. Heg, secretary Washington board of health, and Dr. Alfred Kinney, of Astoria.

"Compensation of Health Officers." Dr. E. A. Pierce, Salem, and C. J. Smith, Pendleton; Hon. Thomas F. Ryan, county judge of Clackamas county, and Hon. Virgil E. Watters, county judge of Benton county.

"Full Returns of Vital Statistics." Dr. C. J. Smith, Pendleton.

"Prevention of Tuberculosis." Dr. J. H. Yocom, of Tacoma, Wash.; Dr. H. S. Nichols, Portland, and Dr. E. B. Pickel, Medford.

"School Hygiene." Dr. F. W. Van Dyke, Grants Pass, and Dr. Mae H. Cardwell, Portland.
