Elder Pratt is here looking after the work of the Mormon church and on Sunday will hold a general conference with the members.—Boise Capital News.

Wrestling With Slot Machines. Another effort will be made at a future council meeting to pass the ordinance on slot machines. The second move is taken because of the belief that some of the councilmen did not understand the purport of the ordinance defeated at the meeting last Tuesday night.

The ordinance introduced was prepared by Assistant Corporation Counsel Connor at the request of the mayor, and is a copy of the state law making the operating of merchandise slot machines a misdemeanor. It was rumored about the city hall yesterday that the cigar men and others who had slot machines in their places of business were in favor of the passage of the ordinance, and were greatly disappointed because of the adverse action of the council.—Spokesman-Review.

Sheep Shearing Commences. Advances from Weiser, Mountain Home, Shoshone, Bliss and other places is to the effect that sheep shearing has commenced. At Weiser

about 30,000 head have been sheared. By next week, if the weather is propitious, it will be in full blast all over the state. It has been commenced earlier this year than usual on account of the prevalence of scab which seems to be worse this season than usual. No buyers have yet arrived, but they are expected within a few days, when a price will be established.—Huntington Herald.

Lewiston Pioneer Teacher. Mrs. Simon of Spokane, who taught school in Lewiston 32 years ago, is a visitor in the city, the guest of Mrs. C. A. Thatcher. Many residents here, now heads of families, received their first instruction in the a-b-c's from Mrs. Simon and she is held in sincere reverence by all. The bell now used to summon the children to school is the same purchased by Mrs. Simon from the proceeds of an entertainment given by her to raise funds to secure the bell. Mrs. Simon has been visited by many of her old pupils and she is greatly enjoying her visit here.—Lewiston Tribune.

Don't Like Parcels Post. Dayton Commercial Association has decided to take decisive action in opposition to Congressman W. R. Hearst's parcel post bill. Monday a letter was received by the Columbia County Dispatch from Hon. Addison G. Foster of Tacoma, who is chairman of the United States senate committee, commending an editorial in the Dispatch setting forth the evils that would accrue to the business of the small towns by the passage of this bill.—Columbia County Dispatch.

Dayton Will Exhibit. The Commercial Association has taken up the question of sending an exhibit from Columbia county to the Lewis and Clark fair at Portland. HONORS FOR ELIOT HAS BEEN PRESIDENT OF HARVARD 35 YEARS.

Many Famous Men Will Unite to Do Honor to the Great Educator—Millionaire Alumni Are Expected to Make the University a Costly Present—One Endowment of \$250,000 in Honor of President Eliot is Announced.

Boston, Mass., March 19.—President Charles W. Eliot of Harvard University will be 70 years of age tomorrow and the anniversary is to be made the occasion for a magnificent testimonial of the honor and esteem in which he is held not only by Harvard men throughout the world, but by the American public in general.

For several months a committee of Harvard alumni, headed by such men as President Roosevelt and Charles S. Fairchild, has been busy maturing plans for the testimonial. Their work has been conducted in secret and even now the exact nature of the tribute is not definitely known. The full plans may not be made public until commencement time in June when there will be a celebration of the thirty-fifth anniversary of Mr. Eliot as president of the university.

It is understood that alumni who include many multi-millionaires will glorify the president either by the erection of a magnificent Eliot memorial building or by establishing an enormous endowment fund to be used in college extension or in the shape of scholarships and benefices. A conservative estimate of the sum that will be thus gathered places it in the millions. One endowment of \$250,000 has already been announced. It is also intended to present to the university a portrait of President Eliot to be painted by John S. Sargent.

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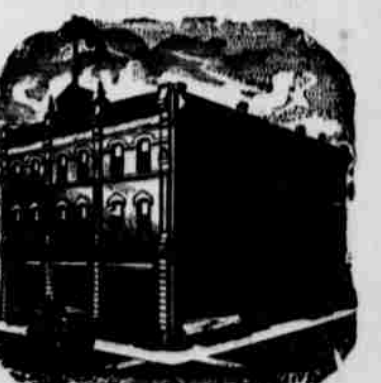
