WIRELESS SERVICE

WESTERN UNION CAN REACH YOUR FRIENDS AT SEA.

Tolls Arranged and System Connected With Regular Wireless Systems of Atlantic Coast—Steamers Equipped With Wireless Apparatus—Directions for Reaching Friends at Sea.

Rates have been received at the Western Union Telegraph office here by which messages may be transmitted by wireless telegraphy to passengers on the big liners sailing between Eastern ports and Europe.

People in Pendleton can now have a message delivered to a passenger on an oceanic steamer at sea by the payment of the usual tolls for the message to the East, and in addition \$2 for the first 10 words and 12 cents for each additional word in the message exclusive of address and signature.

If communication is wished with a passenger on the steamship New York while yet many miles from port, it may be had by addressing the individual in care of "S. S. New York, via Sagaponack, N. Y."

If it is not delivered, the expense to the sender will be only that of sending a message from here to Sagaponack. These messages may be sent via Babylon, N. Y., as well, and in case of the steamships of the American line, or of the Finland and Kroonland of the Red Star Line, a third route is available, via Siasconset, Nantucket Island, Mass.

The liners equipped with wireless apparatus, to which messages may be sent in this manner are: Cunard Line: Aurania, Campania, Carpathia, Etruria, Ivernia, Luconia, Saxonia and Umbria.

American Line: New York, Philadelphia, St. Louis and St. Paul, French Line: LaBretagne, La Lorraine, La Savoie, La Touraine and La Champayne.

North German Lloyd Line: Kaiser Wilhelm II., Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse, Kronprinz Wilhelm. Atlantic Transport Line: Minnehaha, Minneapolis, Minnetonka.

Hamburg-American Line: Auguste Victoria, Blucher, Deutschland, Fuerst Bismarck, Moltke.

Red Star Line: Finland, Kroonland, Vaderland and Zealand. As other vessels become equipped they will be added to the list.

SUGAR BEET CULTURE. President Status and Prospects of This Year's Venture.

E. W. McComas has returned from a trip to Echo and Switzer's Island, where he went to see the work being done by the sugar beet planters. He finds that there are now 150 acres ready to be seeded as soon as the weather settles and warms to a degree where the farmers will be sure that the seed will germinate soon after being put into the ground.

It was the intention to put their ground in seed this week, but the cold weather has changed that, and the work will not be done until later, when warm weather is assured.

There are 150 acres of land which is under consideration, and if it is decided that there can be water enough furnished for it this tract will also be seeded to beets, making 300 acres in and around Echo, Foster and on Switzer's Island, which will be planted this first year of the experiment.

MEDAL CONTEST TONIGHT. Women of the W. C. T. U. Will Render an Excellent Program at the Baptist Church.

The Demorest Medal contest, under the auspices of the W. C. T. U., will take place tonight at the Baptist church, and an interesting entertainment has been arranged. The program will consist of eight contesting recitations, besides numerous musical numbers and the awarding of the prizes at the close.

The women who have charge of the contest have worked energetically to prepare the program and a large attendance is anticipated.

This is a part of the temperance campaign which is to be conducted by the local W. C. T. U., during the coming spring and summer months.
