HURTS PENDLETON

CALIFORNIA PAPER MAKES
UNTRUE STATEMENTS.

Says City of Pendleton is a Small, Out-of-the-way Place Off the Main Lines of Railroad — Women of Woodcraft Are to Build Magnificent Office Building in Pacific Jurisdiction—Pendleton May Get It.

The Central California Woodman, in a fit of enthusiasm over the prospect of a building for the Women of Woodcraft being located in Fresno, where that paper is published, says the present headquarters of the grand guardian is located at "Pendleton, Ore., a small, out-of-the-way place, off the main lines of railroad, express or telegraph companies."

If the paper in question had taken trouble to look up the history of Pendleton in its newspaper directory it would not have uttered this unjust and untrue statement.

Pendleton is a city of almost 7,000 people, as shown by its school census of 1,616 this year; it has seven through mails each day, is on the main line of the Harriman system, reaching from Chicago to Portland, and as great a line as runs through California, and being at the junction of the O. R. & N., from where one main branch line runs to Spokane, is peculiarly situated with regard to reaching all parts of the Northwest, with the greatest convenience.

The office of the grand guardian could reach all parts of the Pacific jurisdiction quicker and more cheaply from this city than from any part of the Northwest or West. The W. & C. R. railroad, a main artery of the Northern Pacific system, touches here, and ramifies through Washington, giving quick access to all the principal towns of that state, while the O. R. & N. connects with the Great Northern and Northern main lines at Spokane, placing the states of Idaho and Montana within a very few hours of this city.

Pendleton is one of the most promising locations that has been mentioned for the new building of the Women of Woodcraft, and if the citizens and the commercial association exhibit the proper enterprise this magnificent building will come to this city.

The order will build a splendid office building at some place in the Pacific jurisdiction soon, and Pendleton can show greater advantages than any other city of its size in the jurisdiction.

Some people say that advertising does not pay, but their claim is quashed by the record of the Pendleton Woolen Mills. This institution sent an exhibit to Japan when that nation held its fair a couple of years ago, and since that time a steady stream of inquiries are coming into the mill from all over the world, from people who have seen the exhibit, or have seen the output of the mills elsewhere.

Since the first day of January the mill has received letters from Plantain River, Honduras; Bluefields, Nicaragua; Richmond, England; Kobe, Japan; Prague, Austria; Tacloban, Philippines; Matidi, Congo, Africa; Alexandria, Egypt; and other places more frequently before the reading public. Nearly all of the letters had orders enclosed for some peculiar design of goods.
