FINE FRUIT PROSPECT.

Washington Will Produce a Banner Crop This Year.

"Indications are that the state of Washington will produce the banner fruit crop in its history this year. In the fruit districts of the state weather conditions were never known to be more favorable. Not even late frosts will prove injurious to the trees, because in certain parts of the state—Yakima and Wenatchee, for instance—there has been late snow, which has kept the fruit buds back. No live action is visible in the orchards of Yakima and Wenatchee at the present time, and it now seems as if nothing could prevent the orchards yielding with a generosity never before equaled."

Such is the statement made to the Walla Walla Statesman by State Horticultural Commissioner A. Von Holderbeke, who returned to his home after an absence of 19 days spent in the orchards of the eastern part of the state. He visited Yakima, Walla Walla, Wenatchee and Spokane, and was impressed with conditions in each place.

SPOKANE SCHOOL CENSUS.

Increase of 1,141 Scholars in the Past Year.

When Superintendent Tormey of the Spokane public schools looked over the September reports from the different schools of the first month's attendance, he predicted that it would not be more than three or four months before the registration would be 1,000 in excess of last year's total, says the Spokesman-Review.

How near that prediction was to the fact may be gathered from the following excerpts from the report of Secretary Thomas of the school board, for the month ending March 4:

Total enrollment to date, 9,500; average number belonging for the month, 7,946; average daily attendance for the month, 7,649; average per cent of attendance, 96; total number of tardies to date, 7,559; total number of tardies for the month, 1,457; total number of corporal punishments, 126; total number of suspensions, 29; total number of visits by patrons, 2,889.

Comment as to comparisons is given thus: "Compared with the corresponding month last year this report shows an increase of 960 in the enrollment, of 1,056 in the average number belonging for the month, and of 1,141 in the average daily attendance for the month."

I wish to call attention to the fact that although there is an increase of but 960 in the enrollment, the average daily attendance over last year shows an increase of 1,141. This shows a great improvement in the attendance record."
