MAY CONSOLIDATE

AN O. R. & N. AND SHORT LINE MERGER EXPECTED.

Believed to Be Due April 1—A. L. Mohler May Succeed Burt, Harriman to Operate Personally in Other Fields—E. E. Calvin to Succeed Mohler—Possible the Headquarters of the New Combination Will Be at Salt Lake.

Portland, March 25.—That President A. L. Mohler, of the O. R. & N., is to be promoted to a position with the Union Pacific at Omaha, and that Assistant General Manager E. E. Calvin, of the Short Line at Salt Lake City, is to come here to fill Mr. Mohler's place, was practically confirmed in this city yesterday.

It is pretty generally understood that the new arrangement will go into effect April 1, and official confirmation is looked for within the next day or two.

Mr. Mohler, it is understood, will assume the position vacated by President Burt, and will exercise the same authority as that official over the Union Pacific. It is not definitely known whether he will assume the title of president or vice-president, but it is generally believed here that he will secure the former title, and that Mr. Harriman, who was recently elected to that position, will resign. It was believed that Mr. Harriman accepted the place only temporarily, and the later developments seem to confirm that opinion.

Mr. Mohler's Successor.

Mr. Calvin, who is to come here in Mr. Mohler's place, it is understood, will not be president of the O. R. & N., but will occupy the position of general manager and exercise general authority over the affairs of the road in Oregon and Washington.

Mr. Calvin is an able railroad man. He has been with the Short Line a number of years, and his promotion to the position he will hold with the O. R. & N. is looked upon as a deserved recognition of his services to the former road.

Consolidation of Two Roads.

This change of officials and the addition to the Short Line of that section of the Central Pacific road between Reno and Ogden and the section of the Union Pacific between Green River and Ogden, is believed by some to be one of the effects of the merger decision. These lines can be merged without violating the law, and it appears to be the general impression that this policy is being pursued that other conditions which must be met as a result of the adverse decision on the merger may be more easily dealt with.

While there is no official information to confirm it, it is the gossip of the hour that further changes involving the Short Line and O. R. & N. are contemplated. A number of facts are cited in support of such a theory. Among railroad men there is a belief that the changes announced are but a step toward the consolidation of the O. R. & N. and the Short Line.

This consolidation is not looked for in the immediate future, but if it does come it will mean, it is believed, that the general offices of the combined roads will be at Salt Lake and the local offices of the head officials of the O. R. & N. will be abandoned, or rather moved to Salt Lake. Of course terminal offices will be maintained here, and the present officials of the road will no doubt be cared for with positions on the consolidated or some other line. The interests of the two roads, it is argued, are practically the same, and they were built originally with the idea that they should be one road.

One fact cited in support of the theory that a consolidation is planned is that the position of president of the O. R. & N. will be left vacant.

The present atmosphere of unsettledness that pervades railroad circles is looked upon as a fair indication that there are likely to be some sweeping changes not only on the Harriman lines, but on others as well.

To Supreme Court.

Spokane, March 25.—The Lucille Dreyfus Mining Company's affairs, which were put in such bad shape by the forgeries of Howard J. Kressly, are to have a hearing on two different lines before the state supreme court. The first will be an appeal from the injunction issued by Judge H. L. Kennan. The second will be an application for a writ of prohibition, directed to Judge Kennan, restraining him from enforcing or attempting to enforce the injunction issued by him last December.

Albert Martin, the Siletz Indian who murdered his fellow tribesman, Grant, on the reservation, three months ago, has made a motion for a new trial at Portland. He stands convicted of manslaughter.

N. P. TAKING PRECAUTIONS.

Carefully Guarding the Road and Running Trains Slowly.

Spokane, March 25.—The uncertain condition of the Northern Pacific roadbed west of Spokane is causing the officials considerable uneasiness. The road is being made safe as fast as possible. Orders have been issued to all engineers to run carefully and not exceed the scheduled time between Sprague and the west end of Big lake and between Marshall and Cheney.

A telegraph station has been put in at Mesa, which will be kept open day and night. The company is getting gravel at Mesa for strengthening the road bed in various places, and several gangs of men are at work there.

CATTLE AND SHEEP.

Tariffs for Stock by the Trainload for Montana and Dakota.

Huntington, March 25.—The Northern Pacific and the O. R. & N. have established a joint rate on stock cattle and stock sheep by the trainload from Huntington, Ore., and intermediate points to points between Livingston, Mont., and Sterling, N. D., for the large 36-foot stock cars which are used exclusively in the western traffic now. The old rates apply to 30-foot cars. The rates for 36-foot cars to Livingston will be \$104.40, and will gradually increase with the distance until it is \$153.12 to Sterling. The rate applies to trains of not less than 10 cars, and the stock must be billed by way of Butte.
