GENERAL NEWS.

The few vessels comprising the Panama navy are to be sold, as being an altogether useless luxury.

A head-end collision in the suburbs of Los Angeles resulted in the death of Mrs. Maria A. Fowler, of Portage, Wis.

A gold and mother-of-pearl snuff-box inlaid with diamonds and made in 1755, recently sold in London for \$32,000.

Winter wheat conditions in Kansas and Oklahoma are precarious and a general failure of that crop—the first in nine years—threatens.

During the week ending March 5, there were 350 deaths from pneumonia in New York City; from the 5th to 12th there were 278, and 32 from grip.

President Roosevelt is credited with having a plan for a protectorate over San Domingo, and also with another plan to hold it in reserve until after election.

Perchellmbers robbed the residence of E. T. Jeffrey at Chicago, of \$3,000 worth of jewelry and diamonds. Jeffrey is president of the Denver & Rio Grande.

Business at Grand Rapids, Mich., is at a standstill on account of a flood. Forty manufacturing establishments in the lower part of town are flooded to the middle of the first story.

Forty masked men broke into the St. Clair, Mo., jail and took out Winn Davis, accused of highway robbery. They gave him an unmerciful whipping with blacksnakes and turned him loose.

Professor Carl Schuman, curator of the Royal Botanical Museum at Berlin, is dead. He is said to have been the most learned man in the world, with one exception, about flowering plants and shrubs.

Under the general ruling of martial law a house-to-house search is being made in Las Animas county, Colorado, for firearms. It is expected that the military will get all that are not too securely hidden to be found.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Great Northern has been practically blockaded for three weeks by snowslides in the Crow's Nest Pass district.

Al Waterbauer, a brakeman on the Great Northern, was instantly killed by being run over by a switch engine in Seattle, on Friday.

The price to be paid for the salmon catch this year will be 5 cents for fish weighing under 25 pounds, and 6 cents for those weighing over that amount.

George Jenkins, a son of Colonel D. P. Jenkins, of Spokane, is dead as a result of injuries received in the wreck of the electric car in Spokane last Monday.

Tom O'Brien, the stage driver from Prairie City to Burns, who stole the stage, team, mail and all, three weeks ago, has been indicted by the federal grand jury at Portland.

The estimated output of salmon along the Columbia river this season is 750,000 cases. The demand for salmon is greater at this season of the year, than for several years.

Elder Nephi Pratt, head of the Mormon church in the Northwest, is moving his headquarters from Spokane to Boise City, from where he will direct the affairs of his territory.

Two freight engines pulling a train up the grade near Truckee, Cal., were buried under an avalanche of snow 30 feet deep, Friday. One engine crew tunneled out by digging with coal shovels, one crew being held prisoners for four hours, before their companions released them.

Mrs. O. D. Wolfe, of Portland, lost a valuable ring several days ago and accused a 9-year-old neighbor girl of stealing it. The child was placed under arrest and yesterday Mrs. Wolfe found the ring in an old jewelry case, where she herself had placed it and forgotten about it.
