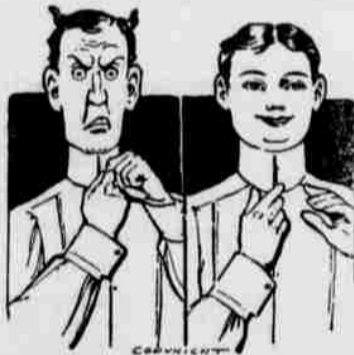

SEVENTY-FOUR NEW BUILDINGS ADDED TO PENDLETON

The people of Pendleton have added 74 new residences and business houses to the number already in the city during the year, beginning March 1, 1903, and ending March 1, 1904.

These houses have ranged in value from \$500 to \$60,000, and represent as modern structures as can be found in the Northwest. In them will be installed the home and business interests of at least 400 more people than were in the city at this time last year, and from the indications of the present time and the growth of the city during the past few months, it is a very evident fact that at least as many more will be needed before the people who are coming and are already here, will be comfortably housed.

There are but a very few vacant houses of any kind in the city at this time and many of those without occupants are the properties of farmers and stockmen who come to the city for the winter months and then when the spring opens and their work calls them to the fields, leave their city homes to remain idle for the summer season. The rest of them are practically all engaged as fast as they are vacated by those who are leaving or moving to other places.

This condition of affairs and the inquiries made of the local real estate dealers lead them to compute that it will require at least 50 new residences in the city this year to accommodate the new population that is coming not to take into consideration the natural demand from the usual increase locally. And from the

talk and plans being laid it is safe to presume that a large part, if not all of this number will be provided for during the building season, which is about to open. A list of the new buildings erected between the dates mentioned, is given below:

Mason, Helena, Mont.: On prospectus showing stock worth 2 cents, don't hold. A. D. Stillman." Since that time the literature has stopped and Mr. Stillman has begun to burn up the store of papers received, saving coal thereby.
