PURE BLOODS PAY

G. W. LINSNER BELIEVES IN
GRADING UP HERDS.

Herefords Have Proved to Be Good
Rustlers Under All Conditions—
They Need Less Feed and Less
Shelter Than Other Stock to Get
Through the Winter in Good Con-
dition—Umatilla County Stockman
Believes in Owning Small Herds
of Good Cattle for Profits.

G. W. Linsner, a large cattleman
of Ridge, in conversation with the
East Oregonian recently, said:

"Scrub stock is gradually being
eliminated from the Oregon range.
An experience I have had during the
last winter confirms me in my choice
of pure-bred stock.

"Six months ago I bought two 3-
year-old Hereford cows (pure bloods)
from the Wade ranch at Hot Lake.
These cows had been raised in the
barn. I turned them out on the
range to rustle for themselves, un-
der the same conditions as the rest
of my cattle, which had been under
range conditions all of their lives.

"During the winter I fed hay to
them all as was needed. One of the
Herefords suckled a calf during the
winter. The two pure-bred Herefords
came out in better shape than any of
the rest of the bunch. When you
know that I was running 225 head
of cattle, Shorthorns and grade
Shorthorns, thoroughly used to range
conditions, you can see that this ex-
perience proves the Hereford the
ideal range animal.

"With the same amount of feed
they will put on more fat and they
are harder than any other breed I
know of. A scrub requires as much
range, eats as much hay and will sell
as beef for not much more than half
as much as the Hereford, while its
progeny is of but little value. Here-
ford calves, on the contrary, always
being in good demand.

"I notice that the newspapers are
constantly agitating the breaking up
of the ranges into homesteads. A
good deal of this talk arises from
lack of knowledge of the real condi-
tions. The southern half of Umatilla
county is not adapted to wheat raising
or farming, while it is adapted to
stock raising.

"It is foolish to talk about running
a stock ranch with a quarter section
of land. One requires a section or
so of land for the home ranch, where
the cattle can be wintered and where
hay can be raised to carry them
through, then it is necessary to have
summer range.

"Take my own case for example.
I have a section or so of land at
Ridge, and my summer range is on
Bridge creek, near the north fork of
the John Day.

"The time when a man could run
cattle or sheep without owning any
land is past. Hereafter it was pos-
sible to keep stock moving from
place to place on government land,
and thus care for the stock. But
that time is past. It is no longer
safe to count upon government grass.

"One must have deeded land of
their own. But even with restricted
land holdings, pure-bred stock and a
larger amount of acreage put in hay
one will still be able to make good
money handling stock. For instance,
I have not received less than four
cents, and from that to five cents a
pound on foot for my cattle for the
past seven years.

"I winter them and turn them out
in good shape in May or June, when
good meat is scarce, and get good
prices. I have been building up my
herd for the past seven years by the
purchase of blooded stock, having
gotten some excellent bulls during
this time."

DENVER CHARTER ELECTION.

Principal Issue is Regulation of the
Franchises.

Denver, Col., March 29.—Denver is
holding a special election today to
decide on the adoption of the new
city charter just completed. The
election is the culmination of one of
the fiercest struggles in the history
of the city and the result will be
awaited with interest by numerous
other cities throughout the country
that have been agitated over the
question of properly controlling and
regulating public utilities for the
best interests of the community.

The charter being voted on in Den-
ver limits all franchises to 20 years
and reserves to the people the right
to regulate rates for service.

PROTECT CODE BOOKS.

Precautions Taken on American War
Vessels.

Washington, D. C., March 29.—
The sensation created in British na-
val government circles by the recent
loss of the signal book of the cruiser
Prince George, while the vessel was
lying in the River Tagus, has called
attention to the supreme importance
of such books and the necessity of
their being well guarded. Investi-
gation shows that on vessels of the
United States navy special precau-
tions are taken to prevent the code
books getting lost.

The books are kept in the chart
room in a specially constructed
metal case bored with holes. The
books themselves have lead attached
to them, the idea being that if a
ship was in danger of being captured
or lost the officer in command, by
throwing the signal-book and books
overboard, would insure their not
falling into improper hands. When
the watch is changed on board ship
attention is always called to the sig-
nal books, so that with all these pre-

cautions it would seem impossible
for them to be lost very long with-
out being missed.

SOUTH DAKOTA DEMOCRATS.

First Western State Will Probably
Declare for Hearst.

Sioux Falls, S. D., March 29.—The
democratic state convention assem-
bles here tomorrow and many dele-
gates and party leaders are already
on the ground. The convention prom-
ises to be one of great interest as the
delegates to be chosen to the na-
tional convention will be practically
the first selected by any Western
state.

At all the recent county conven-
tions the Hearst interests have man-
ifested great activity and those in
charge of his campaign in South Da-
kota are confident today that the
state convention will declare in his
favor.

The adoption of Hearst resolutions
by the South Dakota convention will
be all the more important, as it may
be expected to have its effect in in-
fluencing the conventions to be held
later in North Dakota and other
neighboring states.

SENATOR IN LIMBO

CAUSED BY TOO MUCH
GRAFT ON THE SIDE.

Used His Position to Give Away Post-
al Department Secrets to His "Cli-
ents." Who Got Tired of Being
Blackmailed and "Peached"—Was
Exposed in Another Dishonest Deal
a Year Ago.

St. Louis, March 29.—That Sena-
tor Burton of Kansas, used his official
influence to secure secret post-
office department information in be-
half of the Rialto Grain and Securi-
ties Company, one of the boldest of
the St. Louis get-rich-quick swindles
first exposed by the Denver Post,
has been proved beyond contradiction
by the United States govern-
ment during its presentation of the
case against the Kansas statesman.

That Senator Burton received \$500
a month in cash, and not in checks,
as is usual, for acting nominally as
counsel for the men at the head of the
swindle, and that he decided not
to appear as a attorney for the defense
on the only occasion when his strictly
legal services would have been of
avail, was also shown by several
witnesses whose testimony it will be
impossible to overthrow.

Letters and telegrams introduced
in evidence show that Burton tried
to earn his salary by notifying his
principals of the movements of post-
al inspectors and by seeking to pre-
vent the issuance of fraud orders
and not by giving legal advice. The
most important letters were burned
at his request, but there was nothing
to show that he ever wrote one word
such as a regular attorney would.

The trial has developed absolute
proof of every charge made by the
Denver Post in February 1903. At
that time Burton's connection with
the fraudulent National Securities
Company, of which Swindler Brooks
was the head, was fully established
by documentary evidence reproduced
in the Post and in the Post only.
Telegrams were sent to Senator
Burton to explain matters. He re-
fused to reply. He is now on trial
on criminal charges and must reply.

The first presentation of the Pas-
sion Play in Chicago was made
