CUT THE CHICKEN

FORMULA OF BINDING
FORCE TO THE CHINESE.

Has a Religious and Intelligent Significance—Is a Portent of Great Disaster to a Perjurer—It Means Nothing to the White Man, Whose Oath Means Nothing to the Chinaman—Nature Fully Explained.

The spectators at the justice court yesterday afternoon wondered at the meaning of the chicken killing formula, and one of the educated Chinamen has told what it means. The witness, when the oath is administered, kneels on the floor and has the complaint read to him. He is then asked if he understands the nature of the action, and with all the solemnity that a sacred rite requires of him, the witness calls upon his gods to behold that he is about to bear witness in the case, and calls upon the deity to notice that he asks that if he fails to tell what is true, the same fate may befall him as that which overtakes the fowl, which is then slain by him.

So strong is the regard of the Chinaman for his oath that he believes that in the event of a witness perjuring himself he will soon die. This was illustrated yesterday, when Lee Mon, a Chinaman, was called to the witness stand. He took the American oath and was ready to swear in his testimony in favor of the defendant. The counsel for the plaintiff insisted that the witness "cut the chicken," but he refused, saying in Chinese to the interpreter, "I would not cut the chicken for \$1,000." He knew that his testimony was shaky and did not dare to provoke the wrath of his God, though the God of the American made no difference.

HOMER IS AT LARGE

LEFT LONG LIST OF
UNPAID ACCOUNTS.

Also a Deficit of Four Hundred Dollars With the Indiana State Life Insurance Co.—Was in Limbo Before Leaving for Working Off a Bad Check at Echo—Was Figuring on Starting a Fraternal Insurance Company of His Own.

It has been learned that W. J. Homer, who for the past year represented the Indiana State Life Insurance Company in this district, who skipped out for parts unknown, has behind him a \$400 deficit in his accounts with the company, to mention nothing of a lot of unpaid bills among his friends here as souvenirs of his companionship. Jewelry stores, hotels, dry goods stores and in fact nearly every kind of a store in the city are on the list of those who have believed that he would pay his debts before he left.

He also had a unique scheme in relation to his insurance policies. He would collect from the men who had taken out policies with him, would give a receipt for the money and then pocket it for his own use. Before leaving he passed a crooked check in Echo, and was placed under arrest for it, but the matter was hushed up. He is now supposed to be in California, where he said he was going to start a fraternal insurance company of his own.

MANAGER OF WADE HERD.

N. C. Maris May Take Charge of Another Fine Herd in Near Future.

N. C. Maris, who has had charge of the Wade cattle for several years, had the misfortune yesterday afternoon to run a rusty nail in his foot, and as a result is now on crutches. The wound is quite painful, but no ill effects are expected, as good care was taken of the wound.

Mr. Maris has been in charge of the Wade cattle since Mr. Wade began to gather the fine breeds together and has managed the herd on all the exhibition tours made to different Northwest fairs.

Before taking charge of the cattle Mr. Maris was with the Rural Spirit, the well known stock paper edited by M. D. Wisdom of Portland, and it is probable that he will again take his old position as soon as he has disposed of the last of the Wade herd.

Several propositions have been made to Mr. Maris asking him to take charge of herds of fine cattle at different places over the country and he will give them his attention and may possibly decide to take one of them in preference to the place with the paper. He will remain in the city for a short time after having finished shipping the Wade cattle.

WADE CATTLE SHIPPED.

Fine Herd of Eastern Oregon Sent Out to the Homes of Different Purchasers.

The Wade cattle are being shipped out today by Mr. Maris and his assistants. A trainload of the big cows went out this morning to the west and another shipment was made this afternoon to Walla Walla; the California and North Yakima shipments will be sent out tomorrow.

The cattle bought by Gilbert and Patterson, of Salem; Brock & McComas of this city for their Lyle ranch in Washington; A. R. Byrket of Bingen; W. B. Cate of Hillsboro; J. W. Foley of St. Johns, Wash., and M. F. Gose of Pomeroy, left in the train this morning for the ranches of their future owners.

The Walla Walla shipment consisted of a carload, and the shipments to J. H. Glide of Sacramento, and A. J. Splawn, Fred Brooks and H. Dunn of North Yakima will make a carload for each purchaser.

BAPTIST MINISTER ARRIVES.

Rev. G. L. Hall Will Take Charge of the Church in This City.

Rev. G. L. Hall, of Clyde, N. Y., who has been called to the Baptist church in this city, has arrived with his family and will preach his first sermon on next Sunday morning.

Mr. Hall is a young man of 30 years, is a graduate of the Rochester Theological Seminary, has a wife and one child and comes highly recommended as an able, progressive worker. The Baptist pulpit has been vacant since the resignation of Rev. R. W. King, three months ago, and the congregation will be pleased to have a permanent minister again. Mr. Hall and family will occupy the Baptist parsonage at once.

COUNCIL MEETING.

Court Street and Plumbing Ordinance Will Come Up.

The city council will meet this evening for its regular meeting. The matter of the opening of the west end of Court street will be brought up and settled. It is understood that the residents of that locality are in favor of the improvement, and will sign the petition for the opening, but they are not very desirous of increasing the value of their property to too great an extent, since it will also make them heavier taxpayers.

The plumbing ordinance will be brought up at this meeting also, as it has been prepared by the committee and is now ready for the council to pass upon. Outside of these matters the other business of

the meeting will be mostly routine, as there is nothing of importance to demand the attention of the aldermen.

Large Crowd Attended the Presentation of This Favorite Play at the Frazer.

Small's scalp was split open for a distance of six inches and his skull slightly fractured.
