GENERAL NEWS.

The city of Calgary, Alberta, has 29,000 inhabitants.

Mrs. Chauncey Moreland, aged 43, is dead in New York. She weighed 420 pounds.

The National Association of Second and Third-class Postmasters will be held in St. Louis May 18.

A whale struck a torpedo in the Russian bay of Possiet, near Vladivostok. The former was exploded and the latter riddled.

Dan Daly, the comedian, died in New York March 28; his brother in Boston, the 28th. There have been five funerals in the family in nine weeks.

The postoffice department will lay several 5-inch pneumatic mail tubes in Chicago as an experiment. If successful, the system will be extended.

The Dominion government has vetoed the two laws recently enacted by British Columbia, placing severe and effective restrictions upon Chinese and other immigration.

The city of Indianapolis has appropriated \$25,000 for the relief of flood sufferers inside the city limits, and the floods have forced the further expenditure of \$250,000 on public works that were damaged.

James McInerney was injured in the recent cyclone at Indiana Harbor, and his name was in the published list of casualties. This led to his whereabouts becoming known to his first wife in Canada, and now he is in the penitentiary for bigamy.

An organized band of tool thieves is operating in Portland. Each night some carpenter is robbed of his best tools.

J. F. Hubbard, a pioneer of Portland, died at Dayton, Or., Wednesday, aged 70 years. He came to Portland with an ox team in 1865.

Henry Rice, who is under arrest at Walla Walla for forgery, was nearly starved to death when arrested. Having been on a drunk he had not eaten for four days.

Miss Grace Page, a stenographer of Tacoma, rode 40 miles into the interior of Siskiyou county, California, on horseback, to locate a timber claim on Wednesday.

Hereafter the students of Whitman College will be required to remain in the dormitory on Sundays, no attendance on any Sunday amusements to be allowed.

The Rocky Mountain Telephone Company of Spokane, is making preparations to extend its line all over Western Idaho, making Coeur d'Alene City district headquarters.

Hay is selling at \$16 per ton at Lebanon, Or., and many cattlemen are now entirely without feed. One man has already lost 65 head of cattle through a lack of feed and rough weather.

A reward of \$1,000 has been offered for the recovery of the body of Miss Maude Steiner, who was drowned in the burning of the steamer Queen, on February 27, near Tillamook.

Harold Sparks, a clerk in the Baker City postoffice, has been indicted for throwing away paper mail, addressed to the patrons of the office. He thought they received papers they never read, anyway.

Guy Nelson, who was removing some old apple trees from his orchard, at North Yamhill, Wednesday, was caught under a falling tree 40 years old, and his thigh broken, and otherwise seriously injured.

The explosion of an acetylene tank, used to illustrate a lecture in the Baptist church at Fossil, Wednesday night, caused a panic in which many bruises and scratches were received by the escaping audience. There were no fatalities.
