REPUBLICAN PRIMARIES.

Will Be Held Tomorrow for the Election of Delegates.

The republican primaries will be held in this county tomorrow, to elect delegates to the county convention to be held in Pendleton April 9, at the court house. The polls will be open from 1 o'clock in the afternoon until 7 in the evening, and it is expected that the delegations from all of the precincts in the county will be known by midnight.

Up to this time the political atmosphere has been pretty clear, but today the managers are beginning to seek the corners and talk over the prospects, and the tickets to be put in the field tomorrow.

The voting places for the city are: East Pendleton, at the court house; North Pendleton, at the old Bailey house on the northeast corner of Main and Water streets; Pendleton, at the Salvation Army barracks; and South Pendleton, at the Medernack building, on the south side of Garden street, between Webb and Railroad streets.

ALFRED THOMPSON DEAD.

Passed Away With Consumption, Last Night.

Alfred S. Thompson died last night at 10 o'clock in East Pendleton, after an extended illness with consumption. He was 73 years of age and had been in Umatilla county for many years, having come to this county from Missouri in 1864. He has been living near Bingham Springs for some time, and has been very ill in this place for the past month. He leaves a son, John Thompson, who is a ranchman living on the Umatilla below town, and two daughters, Mrs. Mary Boardman, of this city, and Mrs. Gus Stambaugh, who lives on a ranch in the vicinity of Pendleton.

The deceased was an old soldier and the funeral tomorrow afternoon will be conducted by Rev. G. W. Rigby, under the auspices of the G. A. R., the services being held in the parlors of Baker & Folsom.
