## QUIET PRIMARIES

ALL FACTIONS MAKING HARD BUT STILL FIGHT.

No Tickets Were Circulated Until Noon—Supposed to Be a Fair and Gentlemanly Contest, But No Favors Asked or Given—Complete List of Williamson Delegates is Given Below.

The republican primaries are being held this afternoon in the various parts of the county and in this city as well, though it is hard to find out what is being done. At the several polling places the judges and clerks are sitting waiting for the voters to come, and once in a while one comes.

The greatest secrecy was maintained by the heads of each side of the fight as to the tickets to be put out, and it was not until noon that the precious bits of paper were passed around.

At the Williamson headquarters there was no ticket until late this morning. All was a fair fight, and the slate had been smashed and relegated to the junk pile. Every man was to vote as the spirit moved, and not for any stated list of delegates. A ticket was not necessary.

All that was needed was a certain number of men, preferably republicans, and incidentally those of the right faith of republicanism, who should be sent to the county convention.

However, about noon the tide changed and the tickets came out with the ink dry on them. Those political athletes who would like to go to the county convention, and who would in that event wear the big "W" on their sweaters, are noted in the following list of names:
