MANGE IS PLENTIFUL.

Dr. Christie Says the State Veterinary Board Will Stamp it Out This Spring.

"It is true that mange is preva ent in all parts of Eastern Oregon this spring, among both horses and cattle," said Dr. J. Christie, member of the state veterinary board, to the East Oregonian, today.

"The state veterinary board will make an effort to stamp it out by persistently dipping and isolating the affected stock.

"There is a grave doubt in the minds of many socalled veterinari-ans as to whether cattle will take the mange from horses, but there is not the least question about matter in the minds of scientific veterinarians.

imit of a Day's Catch Is 125, Over Five Inches in Length, and No Night Fishing.

The law regulating trout fishing

Open season for fishing from April 1 to October 31; no night dynamiting, seining or fishing otherwise than with book and line is allowed; all fish under five inches in length to be thrown back in the stream; the limit for one day is 125 fish.

The game and fish warden will take particular pains to enforce the laws regulating trout fishing as he has enforced those against killing deer and other game out of season The state pays to propagate the trout in the streams and it is the duty of the official to protect the state's interest.

Especial vigilance will be exercised to prevent fishermen from making unreasonable and unlawful catches, of several hundred in a day, The fish warden will be found at many unexpected places, during the fishing season, this year.

UMATILLA GIRL ABROAD.

Ta-Le-Ka-Pa-Mi Becomes Mrs. Barnard Sherry of Spokane.

Spokane, April 1.-Ta-Le-Ka-Pa-Mi the name of a Umatilla Indian girl who was today licensed to marry a white man of Irish blood by the name of Bernard Domingo Sherry.
