A RAILROAD TRAMP

EXPERT TRADESMEN WHO TRAVEL INCESSANTLY.

Most Prominent Pilgrim on the O. R. & N. is "Blinky" Morgan, Well Known Engineer—Has Worked on All the Big Systems in the Country in the Past 15 Years.

The death of A. H. Bogardus, the "tramp" telegrapher, at Chicago a few days ago, calls to mind the fact that all the railroad trades have professional pilgrims who travel from place to place, and take a special pride in working on the greatest possible number of roads.

The O. R. & N. has "tramp" brakemen, firemen, engineers and telegraphers, who have worked on every road from the Atlantic to the Pacific and from Canada to Mexico, and who are expert men in their trades, but who have an inordinate desire to roam.

One of the most prominent pilgrims of the O. R. & N. system is "Blinky" Morgan, a locomotive engineer, not over 40 years of age, but who has worked on several hundred railroad systems in his life. He is an expert engineer, has handled every imaginable make of locomotive in use, keeps posted and up-to-date on improvements and inventions, and is a "good runner," as they say in railroad circles.

He is not content to work long in a place. He knows every master mechanic in the country, can tell the different rules of the various systems, and is familiar with every city of importance in the west.

Morgan is a son-in-law of T. J. Million of this city and was promoted to the position of engineer on the O. R. & N. about 15 years ago. He has a record for making the fastest time with freight trains of any man on the system, and is generally well liked by all the men on the system. He has worked on the O. R. & N. about 10 different times, taking trips in the intervals to all parts of the country, the last jump being to old Mexico, where he only stayed but a short time. He is not now working for the O. R. & N., but is expected to return this spring.
