### WANTED TO INDICT HIM.

County Surveyor J. W. Kimbrell Has a Narrow Escape Before Federal Grand Jury.

In the hearing of the Cunningham land fraud cases before the federal grand jury, last week, County Surveyor J. W. Kimbrell was called by the government to testify to the character of the improvements on the homesteads of the Umatilla county men indicted for fraud.

The district attorney was asking various questions of Mr. Kimbrell as to the improvements, as follows: "Were there any houses on these homesteads?"

Mr. Kimbrell in answer described the kind of shanties on the claims. "Any fences?"

"No."

"Any barns, corrals, or other improvements?"

"No."

"Were there any wells, springs, or other evidences of civilization on these homesteads, Mr. Kimbrell?" asked Mr. Hall.

"No, there were no wells or springs on these claims," said Mr. Kimbrell, "but this answer needs an explanation. I want to say on this occasion that fully one-third of the best wheat farms in Umatilla county have no wells on them, and that today the owners of these farms, which yield from 25 to 45 bushels of wheat per acre, every year, haul water for domestic purposes from the hydrants in the city of Pendleton, and that the absence of a well in our county is no evidence of barrenness."

The grand jury from Webfoot looked amazed at this statement and it was evident from their actions that they felt that the enthusiastic supporter of Umatilla county on the stand, was in league with the "dummy" homesteaders at the bar of justice.

A Baker county man on the jury dispelled their misgivings by bearing out the testimony of Mr. Kimbrell.

### Missionary Offerings.

The missionary offerings which were received at the Thompson Street Methodist church Sunday, amounted to \$27.32, and since that time pledges have been received which will swell the total to \$250.
