### MILLIONS OF FISH

DESCRIPTION OF SALMON HATCHERY AT ONTARIO.

How the Fish Supply for the Streams of Oregon is Nurtured in Snake River—Output This Year Will Be 25,000,000 Young Salmon—Interesting Process of Propagation.

A. W. Prescott, of Salem, who accompanied the state fish commission on the recent visit to the Ontario fish hatchery, writes the following interesting description of that institution for the Morning Oregonian:

The state fish hatchery at Ontario was constructed in the summer of 1903 in pursuance of an appropriation of \$15,000 made by the legislature of that year. The building is 62x217 feet and when fitted up, including a cottage for the superintendent, has cost some \$13,000. The expenses were reduced about \$2,000 by concessions made by the O. R. & N. Co. in the matter of freight charges on lumber, etc.

The appropriation will be sufficient to cover several improvements which will be made this summer, when this hatchery will be the best as well as the largest of its kind in the United States. The annual cost of operating the hatchery will be about \$6,000. In return for this expenditure, the supply of salmon will not only be maintained but will be increased, thus adding to the wealth-producing power of one of Oregon's best-known natural resources.

The total output of the hatcheries, state and federal, on the Columbia and its tributaries, is now 70,000,000 young fry per year. Although a few years ago the catch of fish was so small that it was believed that salmon were being exterminated, in the last three years the number caught has greatly increased, for which change the hatchery system has been given credit.

The process of artificial propagation of salmon is a simple one. Last fall two sets of fish racks were placed across the river about a quarter of a mile apart. The racks were so constructed that salmon could easily pass through but could not get out again. Between October 15 and November 10 the fish enclosed between the two sets of racks were caught in seines.

From the "ripe" females the eggs were secured by gentle pressure, and the eggs thus obtained were fertilized with milt pressed from the males. About 5,000 females and as many males were used for this purpose, each female yielding 5,000 eggs. The eggs were placed in woven wire baskets about 12x24 inches and six inches deep and placed in troughs of running water of the temperature of that of the river. The troughs are long wooden boxes arranged in rows so that the water pumped into the highest flows through the others and finally back to the river. About 30,000 salmon eggs were placed in each basket.

When the eggs hatched, the fish dropped through the meshes of the baskets into the troughs and the baskets were removed. Hatching began about February 1. By means of perforated tin partitions the troughs are divided into apartments, so that 20,000 young fish are confined in a space about four feet long, 12 1/2 inches wide and eight inches deep. When they become crowded, some are removed to other troughs.

In about six or seven weeks the fish are about an inch and a quarter long and are ready to plant. By means of a rubber hose syphon they are drawn with the water from the troughs into large pails and are then taken to the middle of the river and turned loose.

Not many are turned loose at one time lest large fish should be attracted to them and destroy them. If given a fair chance, the young fish will take care of themselves.

The advantage of the hatchery is that it prevents the destruction of the eggs and protects the fish until they are old enough to get about easily.

**Wanted—A Forester.** D. B. Sheller, representing the forestry bureau in the Northwest in the matter of choosing rangers and keepers, spent a portion of the week in this city conferring with business men in regard to a suitable man for the Elk reserve, which is an area of about 50,000 acres, set aside to protect the water supply of Baker City. Several men have been recommended, whose fitness for the office will be investigated by Mr. Sheller before an appointment is made. The stipend is \$75 a month, and a man must devote his time to the work, although in the winter months little is to be done. Stock must be kept out of the reserve and timber protected from lumbering operations, save where trees are sold, and then they are to be designated by the keeper.—Baker City Herald.
