GENERAL NEWS.

All asphalt work in New York City is tied up by a strike of 7,000 men engaged in that line.

Every actual settler into Canada from the United States can bring with him 16 horses duty free.

A new law in New York makes the testimony of patrons of gambling places compulsory. It has not hitherto been so.

Different claimants are going to law to settle the title to a piece of land near Glen Cove, L. I., which has been in dispute 250 years.

M. Curie, discoverer of radium, believes that a man entering a room containing one pound of radium would be struck dead instantly.

The sugar beet factory at Birmingham, N. Y., has been dismantled and the plant taken to Wallace, Idaho. The Yorkstate farmers would not grow beets.

Mrs. Margaret Sullivan, of Penn Yan, Pa., lived to be 102 years old, only to die of blood poisoning resulting from a scratch by a brass pin on her little finger.

John McFarland and J. A. Ballard, both wealthy and prominent republican politicians of West Virginia, quarreled at the Northfork convention. Both drew pistols and shot each other dead.

Ten men have been indicted for fraud in building the county hospital at Milwaukie. It has cost the taxpayers \$175,000, of which amount \$95,000 is supposed to have been stolen.

An extensive asbestos deposit has been uncovered on Cow creek, in Douglas county.

There are now 112 prisoners in the county jail at Portland, the available room being all occupied.

The annual camping of Seven Day Adventists of Oregon will be held at Corvallis on May 26, to June 5.

Moody delegates claim they will carry the day in the county convention of the republicans in Baker county on Saturday.

The government trading post at Ross Fork, Idaho, was held up on Thursday morning by two masked men, and robbed of \$1,500.

A sneak thief grabbed a wallet containing \$250 from the counter of the American-Scandinavian Bank, at Seattle, Thursday, and made his escape.

Over 300 shopmen in the Albina machine shops of the O. R. & N., have signed letters of regret to President Mohler on his departure for Omaha.

Gambling has been closed at Helena and will remain closed during the term of the present district attorney, who is opposed to open gambling.

Three rural telephone companies were organized and granted the privilege to construct lines along the county roads in Lane county on Thursday.

Alfred Aller, who shot himself at Seattle last week, is now at a hospital, where he curses the doctors for bringing him back to life and dressing his wounds.

President Jefferson Myers, of the Lewis and Clark state commission, threw the first shovel of dirt on the site for the Oregon state building at the fair, on Thursday morning.

A railroad from Huntington to the Seven Devils, is now being agitated by the owners of the Seven Devils copper mines. Without transportation the ore cannot be handled.

REALTY TRANSFERS

FORTY-THREE RECORDED DURING MONTH OF MARCH.

Reservation Addition Contains Most of the Property Sold, and This List is of Pendleton Sales Only—Recorded Prices Run All the Way From One Dollar to Five Thousand Dollars.

Last month was a busy one in the real estate transfer business, there having been 43 sales made in this city. The prices named have been from \$1 in the quit-claim deed to several thousand in the warrantee deeds, and thousands of dollars have been represented.

SEED CORN FOR PHILIPPINES.

Shipment is Made From Dell Rapids, Minnehaha County.

A Sioux Falls, S. D., dispatch, says: "The first shipment of corn to be made from this part of the state to the Philippine islands has just been made by L. K. Larson, of Dell Rapids. The shipment consisted of 50 bushels of South Dakota Yellow Dent seed corn, and was consigned to the government purchasing agent at Manila.

"The order for the corn was filled by J. E. Elliott, and it was quite a task to get it ready for shipment, as it had to be on the cob and packed in large tin-lined boxes, sealed airtight. Nine boxes were made for the consignment, and when ready for shipment the weight aggregated about 4,500 pounds.

"The contract price for the corn was \$3 per bushel packed and delivered at the Dell Rapids depot. It was shipped to San Francisco by express, and from there will be carried to the Philippines on a transport ship. The express charges amounted to more than \$400."

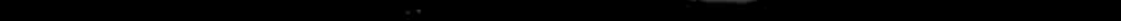
