KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS.

Raised \$50,000 to Endow a Secular Chair in University.

Washington, D. C., April 12.—Hundreds of members of the Knights of Columbus are pouring into Washington from every direction to participate in the ceremonies to be held at the Catholic university tomorrow, when the formal presentation will be made of the fund of \$50,000 raised by the order to endow a chair of secular history at the university.

The occasion promises to be a red letter day both for the Knights of Columbus and the university. Dignitaries of the church to the number of several score will take part and the number of members of the order expected here reaches into the thousands.

A three days' program has been planned for the entertainment of the knights, including parades, receptions and conferences. In addition to the presentation of the endowment fund there will take place during the festivities the formal opening and dedication of the new Apostolic Mission college of the university.

SMOOT INQUIRY RESUMED.

Senate Committee After the Mormon Senator.

Washington, D. C., April 12.—The investigation of the protests against the retention of his seat by Senator Reed Smoot of Utah, was resumed today by the senate committee on privileges and elections.

It is expected that numerous witnesses will be heard this week, including besides several officials of the Mormon church a number of anti-Mormon citizens of Utah. These latter are expected to produce additional evidence that the first presidency and the twelve apostles in their exercise of supreme authority are political dictators and control the political action of the church.

Witnesses also will be called to testify that Senator Smoot, as one of the apostles, encourages the practice of polygamy and polygamous cohabitation by refraining from entering any protest against such practices or to censure any one known to be guilty of it.

To Select Meeting Place.

Chattanooga, Tenn., April 12.—The board of directors of the International Association of Fire Engineers began a meeting in this city today to decide upon the date and place for holding this year's convention of the association. Several cities are bidding for the convention, which probably will be held in October.
