CANVASS THE VOTE

VOTE ON SCHOOL BOND
ISSUE WILL BE COUNTED.

Architects Are Now Making Plans, and Work Will Be Begun as Soon as Sites Are Selected—Board Will Confer With Residents of Different Parts of Town as to Locations.

The school board will hold a meeting this evening to canvass the vote on the bond issue, and announce the official result.

Arrangements will then be made by the board for the advertisement of the bonds and their sale, and plans will be laid for the commencement of the work of building.

Several architects are now at work on plans to be submitted to the board, and as soon as these are perfected and adopted the bids for the contracts will be called for. It will be some days before the board will know just what they can do in the way of building plans, for the locations will have to be determined upon before final plans can be adopted, as the grounds will influence the size and style of the structures.

The residents of the different parts of town will be conferred with in regard to their choice for building sites, and it is hoped to have this part of affairs settled in a short time. As soon as that is done, the commencement of actual work will be a matter of but a few days.

It is hoped by the board to have the buildings well under way inside of a month, and finished and furnished by the time school opens in the fall.
