Road Will Be Built.
We hope to have a considerable portion of the road built this year. There has been some delay, but plans are progressing satisfactorily.

Godman last evening regarding the proposed plans of the Lewiston & Railroad Company, which organized last year to build a road from Huntington, Oregon, to the Snake river to Lewiston, Idaho, who is an official of the company, is in the city en route to attend the session of the court. Some Scab in Grant.
The Blue Mountain Eagle Stock Inspector George Irvin of Monument, that while he had only completed his first annual inspection of sheep of Grant county he had quite a number afflicted with scab. This is particularly true in the Monument country where he has 25,000 sheep are diseased. This necessitates the sheep owners being somewhat earlier than usual in ordering that their bands may be changed.
