SCHOOL POLITICS

AMERICAN INSTINCT COMES TO THE SURFACE.

All Known Political Organizations in the United States Have Duplicate Organizations in the High School—Girls Are Accused of Packing the Primaries for Friday Next in the Interest of Woman Suffrage.

The students of the high school have contracted the political itch and under the management of Prof. Hennig, the instructor in civics, will hold an election of their own.

The whole of Umatilla county is now represented among the students, every precinct having at least one to claim it as their residence. There are two parties or more represented in the school, the leading one of which is the independent prohibition party, which is closely followed by those of the other persuasions, while the matter is further complicated by a large woman suffrage delegation among the girls.

Friday next the primaries will be held and on the afternoon of April 22 the pupils will hold their county convention in the Assembly hall.

The woman suffragists are attempting already to pack the primaries in order to secure control of the delegation, and all the pupils of the school are out for chairman of the convention.

After the convention the general election will be held, after a short and heated campaign. It is thought at this time that the ladies will secure control of the convention and elect the whole ticket.

DECLAMATORY PRIZES.

Pendleton Academy Students Exhibit Ability and Training in Annual Contest.

The declamatory contest of Pendleton Academy was held at the Presbyterian church last night, when eight students of that institution contested for the prizes offered by the management.

Alpha Black, Waltha Newman and Lottie McLeod tried for the prize in the preparatory department, and Emma Cruikshank, Jessie Porter, Vera Marsten and Pearl Porter for the academic prize.

In the preparatory department, Alpha Black took the first prize, \$5 in cash, and Lottie McLeod the second, \$3.

In the academic department, Pearl Porter took first prize, \$5, and Vera Marsten second prize, \$3. All the contestants exhibited ability and training in their selections, and it was difficult for the judges to decide on some of the points in the contest.

Judge Lowell, in making the presentation of the prizes, addressed a few touching and valuable remarks to the students, assuring them of the heartiest wish of the judges of the contest to award prizes to each of the contestants, and gave them suggestions on future selections and further training, which were appropriate and appreciated.
