GENERAL NEWS.

Very little can be learned from Japanese sources, of even Japanese victories.

Thirty thousand men are drawing service pensions as survivors of the Mexican war.

R. van Swanderer is the new representative of the Netherlands to the United States.

The Philippine exhibit at St. Louis will cost \$1,000,000 instead of \$250,000, as was originally intended.

A game cock knocked down a 3-year-old girl at Camden, N. J., and spurred her so badly that recovery is doubtful.

The Mexican International and National railroad of Mexico, will be at once merged. E. N. Brown has been elected president of both.

Congress has appropriated \$25,000 to reimburse W. R. Radcliffe, a British subject, for property destroyed by a mob in Colorado, in 1901.

Daniel Keegan, a fugitive who blew the last call at Appomattox, and really the last bugle call sounded for the Confederacy, is dead at New Orleans.

The Amalgamated Steel Workers Association of Pennsylvania, is trying to force all its employees to accept a horizontal cut of 10 per cent in wages.

Joachim Miller has sued William Randolph Hearst for \$3,000 alleged overdue salary as Hearst's correspondent in China during the Boxer troubles.

Snow fell in New York City April 14, the first time so late in the season for very many years. An estimated three-fourths of an inch came down, but melted as fast as it struck the ground.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The socialists of Linn county have placed a full ticket in the field and hope to elect one representative to the legislature.

The river steamers George H. Vesper and Sue Elmore, collided at Astoria, Thursday, doing about \$3,000 damage to each boat.

All traffic over the John Day river has been stopped by the high water. Many bridges have been washed out and ferryboats cannot be operated.

The Willamette river has been at the danger point near Salem and Oregon City, for the past four days. Cooler nights prevented a serious flood.

Reason McConnell, a prominent farmer of King's valley, near Corvallis, was found dead in his room, Thursday, shot through the head. It is thought by friends to have been an accident.

The Washington irrigation commission will hold its first meeting at Tacoma on April 26. In the meantime it will apply to the Oregon commission for information on different points to be handled by the commission.

Two men who robbed the government trading post at Ross Fork, Idaho, were sentenced to eight years in San Quentin prison, Thursday. They were captured and tried, convicted and sentenced within a week after committing the crime.

A Jap section hand outwitted the Northern Pacific Thursday in escaping from the regular fare charged on a corpse. The man desired to ship his dead child from Prosser to North Yaluma, but declined to pay fare on it. The company refused to haul it free, and the Jap bundled the corpse up and carried it in his arms the entire distance.

HEARST SELLS OUT.

King of Newspaper Makers Transfers a City Lot in Salem.

Salem, April 15.—W. R. Hearst to Louis Goodsell is a transfer that was recorded in the county recorder's office this morning. It conveys all the right, title and interest of the grantor in and to lot 8, in block 9, Morning-side addition to the city of Salem. The consideration is \$1.

The deed was made, executed and delivered in 1895, and the grantor is none other than William Randolph Hearst, the well known newspaper man, member of congress from New York, and prospective candidate for president on the democratic ticket.

At the time the deed was made Hearst was just starting on his world famed newspaper career, and was little known outside of the borders of the state of California.

He was then just plain W. R. Hearst of San Francisco. Afterward he grew into Wm. R. Hearst of San Francisco and New York, and finally William Randolph Hearst, owner of half a dozen big papers, and a leading politician of the East.

Few Salemites were aware that Mr. Hearst had ever owned real estate in this city, and he may be sorry some day that he disposed of his holdings.

MASSACHUSETTS REPUBLICANS.

No Doubt But They Will Instruct for Roosevelt.

Boston, Mass., April 15.—Sixteen hundred delegates filled Tremont temple this morning when the republican state convention was called to order by Attorney General Herbert Parker. The convention will name four delegates-at-large and alternates to the Chicago convention.

By common consent it has been agreed that Senator Lodge, ex-Governor Crane and ex-Governor Long

shall be three of the delegates and indications point to the selection of Col. Everett C. Benton as the fourth member of the delegation. Strong Roosevelt resolutions will be adopted and it is possible that the convention may go a step further and pledge the delegates to vote for Roosevelt in the convention.
