#### GENERAL NEWS.

The Canadian Pacific railway has lost by flood its famous long steel bridge over the Saskatchewan.

It costs \$22,000,000 to run New York City a year, and its share of county and state expenses is \$16,000,000 more.

The Occidental hotel, containing 300 guests, burned at Indianapolis. Nearly 70 were marooned in an upper story and for a time it was believed they could not be saved.

Certain schemes for the improvement of Greater New York, notably the scale upon which the water system is projected, allow for an expansion of the population to 15,000,000.

The United States Steel Corporation has negotiations under way for a community of operation between it and the German steel producers; in other words, an international trust.

H. F. Mellen, for years one of the most prominent society and club men of Denver, has been sentenced to the penitentiary for four years for embezzling \$10,000 from the National Trust Company.

State Mine Inspector Cunningham and Superintendent of Mines Cowden, of Pennsylvania, have been held responsible by the coroner's jury for the Harwick mine disaster of January 27 last, in which 178 men lost their lives.

Superintendent Tittmann, of the United States coast and geodetic survey, and Chief Astronomer W. F. King, of Ottawa, Canada, will proceed at once to survey and permanently indicate the boundary between Alaska and Canada in correspondence with the boundary award commission's decision.

Grant's Pass is to have a cyanide plant costing \$10,000, this spring.

The democrats of Tillamook have endorsed W. R. Hearst for president.

Colville river is over a mile wide in places and is higher than for 50 years before.

Three female applicants took the examination for rural mail carriers at Portland Saturday.

The entire democratic county ticket in Lane county was nominated by acclamation on Saturday.

The rural mail service in Polk county has been increased from three to six trips per week.

Clyde McGraw, aged 3, was drowned while playing on an old millrace at Walla Walla Sunday.

Only one cattleman from Eastern Oregon and five from Southern Oregon attended the cattlemen's convention in Portland on Saturday.

An Indian girl baby belonging to the Golovin Bay tribe, was burned alive Saturday, because of the superstition of the tribe against girl babies.

A hobo passed a \$10 counterfeit bill on a Nampa merchant Sunday. The counterfeiter was afterwards caught in Boise with \$100 in clumsy counterfeiters on his person.

Ashland city officers who were ridding the town of tramps Saturday, were fired upon from ambush by a gang, after which one tramp was shot through the arm. The city jail is now full.

Henry Waterson will lecture at Salem on Tuesday, April 19, on Abraham Lincoln. The lecture is under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A., the proceeds to be used in lifting a mortgage on the Y. M. C. A. building.
