A cut of \$2 per ton has been and nounced in the prices of stock salt in the Portland markets, bringing the price down to \$15.50 per ton. The Portland sait supply is bought

through commission houses and is always about \$1.50 to \$2 per ton higher than the same grade in Pendieton. Even after this cut, it is impossible to handle Portland sait at the reduced price here. Pendleton merchants bought direct from the factories at Salt Lake, and by doing this, secured a price lower than Portland by \$1.75 per ton.

Stock sail is now \$16 per ton in this city about \$12 of this being freight and cartage charges. There is no possibility of the price being here, handled by Pendleton merchants was purchased at a very low figure and being sold at a close margin.
