### GENERAL NEWS.

The executive committee of the American Federation of Labor is in session at Denver.

James S. Vancourt, a wealthy New Yorker 86 years old, has just married his fourth wife, who is 40 years old.

The Petrovalovsk was a 10,960-ton vessel, with 14,000 indicated horsepower, and had been finished six years.

Ignatz Romonso and Thomas Tattio, Austrians, quarreled over a girl in Chicago. The former fatally shot the latter and then blew his own brains out.

The works of the Fore River Ship Engine Company at Quincy, Mass., are held up by a strike of 2,600 men. It delays work on the battleship Rhode Island.

The liner Gaelic, just arrived at San Francisco, narrowly escaped being sunk by two waterspouts on different dates, east of Japan a few hundred miles.

James Grubb, janitor of a New York apartment house, tried to poison his six children. His wife is dead and he worried himself half insane over their care.

A suit has been begun to compel an accounting of receipts against the American Spirits Manufacturing Company (whiskey trust,) by stockholders who claim to be snubbed and frozen out. Over \$135,000,000 is involved.

The authorities of Kansas City, Kan., backed up the civil rights law, and under police protection the 70 colored pupils are attending the public schools. Some white children have been taken out of school, but not a teacher, or member of the school board has resigned.

### NORTHWEST NEWS.

J. J. Larson, a steamer, of Seattle, is in jail for stabbing his young son in a family row.

Josephine county democrats have passed resolutions in favor of W. R. Hearst for president.

Matthias Dorr, a well known citizen of Seattle, was drowned in Lake Union, near that city, while fishing, Tuesday.

Thomas Moriarity, a Northern Pacific switchman, was mangled under the wheels of a freight train at Butte Tuesday morning.

The weather bureau of Portland announces that the Willamette and Columbia rivers will now recede, the highest stage being over for several days.

Leonard Jackson, a young druggist of Seattle, has been missing from his home for three days and his parents fear suicide, as he was despondent over a love affair.

Minnie Martin, of Silver Lake, committed suicide Tuesday by taking strychnine. She was but 11 years of age and took the poison without cause, other than curiosity.

Because he failed to win the hand of a fair grass widow, Mrs. Belle Jones, of Portland, Charles S. Mensch, a steamboat fireman, committed suicide at Portland, Tuesday.

Mrs. Anna Lindquist, of Skagway, Alaska, has just completed the longest sledge journey on record by a woman. She came from Tanana to White Horse, a distance of 1,500 miles, without a companion except her dogs.

Arthur Burke, aged 23, was committed to the Asylum Tuesday, from Kalama, for planning the murder of his entire family, consisting of father, mother, two brothers and four sisters. He had just been released from the California asylum.

# HUBBY HIKE OUT

NEWLY MARRIED MAN  
TURNED UP MISSING.

Suspected That a Former Sweetheart Is Involved in the Disappearance. But That is Only Inference—May Be Only a Case of Cupid Getting Cold Feet—Deserted Wife is Trying to Locate Her Husband.

One sweet dream of romance has been shattered and two fond hearts have been torn asunder, and all on account of a vanished face and a lock of braided hair.

Mrs. Roy Rose, a very pretty little girl of 19 summers, is mourning for an absent lord after just six weeks of wedded bliss, and the lord is wandering from the path in fields unknown.

On February 28 Roy Rose, the 19-year-old son of William E. Rose, a Main street barber, was married to Miss May Holley, also 19 years of age, and the couple went to house-keeping in a little cottage in the edge of town, on Railroad street. Last Tuesday the husband left a note with his wife, since which he has not been seen.

The history of the case is a little mixed and seems to be in part childish, but it is very real to the young woman left behind, and she is seeking by the aid of the law to locate her wandering hubby and bring him back to his home.

For about three days after the wedding, so Mrs. Rose says, no two people on earth could have been happier or more contented, and then the trouble began. It came in the shape of a little hair necklace or chain, the material being taken by Lillie Peterson, a former sweetheart of the newly married man, from her own head and woven by her own fingers. The chain was sent to the young barber with the message that the sender loved him still, and would wait for him until he tired of his bride and would return to her.

The chain was a hoodoo, and Rose struggled against its influence for a time in vain. He then made up his mind to go to Portland, and took his wife there on Sunday morning, two weeks ago. He secured work, and after working one day went from his home in the morning and never returned. His wife found instead, the note which bade her good-bye, and stated that "someone had crossed his path of whom he thought more than of anybody else on God's green world and that he was gone forever."

Mrs. Rose spent several days looking for him in Portland with the aid of the police, and then returned home. Sunday last she heard that he had been seen on the train bound either for Boise City or Salt Lake, and in company with another young woman. The officers have been furnished with pictures of the girl and of the man, and these will be sent to the East in hopes of finding them. If Rose is found alone he will be forgiven, so Mrs. Rose says; but if he has his former sweetheart with him she will prosecute them both. The matter now rests with the sheriff.

### BUSIEST MAIL BOX.

More Letters Deposited at Box in Front of Hotel St. George Than in Any Other in Town.

Naturally patrons of the mail boxes distributed over the city wonder which box is most generally patronized. The department has shown great public spirit in distributing the boxes for the receipt of mail over a wide scope, with the view to accommodating the greatest possible number of people.

Statistics from the carriers show that the outside boxes are patronized but very little. The boxes in the remote streets do not receive mail from one-tenth of the residents in the district in which the boxes are located. As people naturally come to the business districts every day, and many times each day, they mail their letters in the Main street boxes. The box receiving the greatest amount of mail daily, and which keeps up its high average is the one located at the northeast corner of Main and Webb, in front of the Hotel St. George. The next highest is the one in front of the Tallman Drug Company at corner of Alta and Main.
