Irrigating by Electricity. The Baker City correspondent of the Portland Telegram writes: W. J. Patterson is breaking up 320 acres of land near this city, which he is going to irrigate by means of electricity.

There is no water available for irrigating this land in the ordinary way. It is too high up on the bench to divert water from the river, and then there would be no water unappropriated in the river if river water could be conveyed to the land.

There is an abundance of water flowing underneath this land at a depth of about 20 feet. Experiments made last season demonstrated that this source of supply was constant and abundant. The question was how to raise the water to the surface in sufficient quantity to irrigate the land, at an expense that would not be prohibitive.

There is an electric transmission line which conveys electric power to one of the mines which passes over this land. Mr. Patterson hit upon the idea of sinking large wells, and he has made arrangements to put in a number of these pumps. A five-horsepower motor will raise 320 gallons of water per minute, which is sufficient for 80 acres of land.

A large well is put down on the highest part of the tract to be irrigated, and the electric motor and pump does the rest.

Mr. Patterson expects to raise a crop on the land this season that will produce enough to pay for all improvements and leave a neat profit besides.

Water Route to Sumpter.

Tony Mohr of Sumpter, and Tom Dumphrey also of the upper camp, and a semi-resident of Baker City, rolled into town yesterday covered with mud and water and Tony said they had come anyway they could get here. Part of the way they rolled down hill, some of the distance they swam and rowed in a boat through the upper valley, hooped it over the bluffs and rode part of the way on stage and horseback. They enjoyed the trip very much and met the up-going stage which was heavily loaded with passengers and baggage. During the disability of the Sumpter Valley road, stages are operating out of both Baker City and Sumpter, carrying passengers and light parcels, while heavy four and six-horse teams yesterday took out big loads of groceries and all kinds of supplies for Sumpter.—Democrat.

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Eastern Cattle Market Poor.

A letter received from F. M. Lacey of Minneapolis, formerly a resident of this city, contains the statement that there is no sale at all for stock cattle in the East, and most all feeders during the past winter have lost money. From other sources a similar statement has reached the Blue Mountain Eagle. It is accepted by many as a correct condition of the stock market in the East, and that this condition there will have a more or less effect on the sale of cattle here in Oregon.

Mr. Lacey will buy 20,000 two and 3-year-old wethers this spring, this he says, being the only class of stock that there is any demand for at present.

He expects to come to this country in a short time and will likely buy most of the sheep from local sheepmen.—Grant County News.

Lost Ewes in Mudholes.

J. B. Jackson came up from his ranch this morning on business. Mr. Jackson reports lambing progressing nicely at his ranch, there being about 20 pairs of twins and 10 deaths. During the last snow, however, he lost about 100 heavy ewes that mired in soft ground.—Long Creek Eagle.

FRANKLIN COUNTY WHEAT.

Prospects in the Dry Belt Are Now Highly Encouraging.

Dr. J. Marion Smith of Los Angeles, accompanied by his wife, spent yesterday in the city waiting for an O. R. & N. train to go East. Dr. Smith has just returned from Eltopia, Franklin county, Washington, where he has spent a week inspecting his wheat crop and real estate interests and reports wheat in that vicinity in the best of condition. He has 1,440 acres near Eltopia, in the heart of the Franklin county wheat belt, which is now five to ten inches high, growing nicely, with a good stand and well rooted out, giving promise of the best crop in the history of that country.

Dr. Smith has great hopes for that dry district and believes with cultivation and settlement the arid lands will naturally reclaim themselves to a large degree. The government is now making preliminary surveys at different places with a view to irrigating several thousand acres now withdrawn from settlement.

His report of crop conditions there will be good news to many Umatilla county citizens who are now interested in Franklin county land.

SHEEP ON FARMS.

Small Herds Should Be Kept to Destroy Weeds in Orchards.

A small band of sheep on any farm that is reasonably well fenced will far more than repay their winter keep in the weeds which they destroy in summer.

It follows, therefore, that a small band of sheep can be kept on any farm under the conditions just stated without any cost whatever for the food which they consume, to say nothing of the return which they give in wool and mutton.

There are fewer sheep in the United States today, when compared to the population, than there were 50 years ago. In 1850 there 94 sheep per capita and in 1900 there were only 52.

Fifty years ago there were but few sheep exported into other countries and great numbers of them were kept for their fleeces. Fifty years ago the large sheep ranches of Australia and South America had not been started to supply the demand for sheep products as now—Orchard and Farm.
