#### GENERAL NEWS.

Hull House Woman's Club, a purely benevolent organization in Chicago, is to have a \$20,000 headquarters building, as a gift from Mrs. Joseph Tilton Bowen.

The government is establishing a coaling station for a fuel supply for all American vessels at Rat Island, Aleutian Archipelago, latitude 52 north, longitude 177 east.

The University of Chicago has succeeded in evicting the last saloon from any property owned by it. The last was in the Securities building, Chicago, and left the premises last week.

Taking advantage of Russia's pre-occupation elsewhere, England is conducting a vigorous campaign in Tibet from the south, finding but little opposition, and that from Tibetans only.

E. L. Hammer and S. J. Warren are under arrest in Chicago for soliciting and collecting without authority \$5,000 for the Chicago Republican Marching Club. They are professional "con" men.

Robert Nicholson, boatswain's mate of the gunboat Petrel, suicided by shooting at San Francisco, rather than face a charge of bringing liquor onto the ship. He had an excellent record of 24 years in the navy.

Turf regulations this year are as severely rigid against the use of tobacco and intoxicants by jockeys as ring rules for many years have been in relation to their use by men training for boxing and wrestling matches.

#### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

W. G. Stark, the pioneer florist of Portland, died Thursday night, after a long illness, aged 60.

Carl Hudson, of Cornelius, was thrown from a car and killed while driving Thursday afternoon.

Mayor Ballinger, of Seattle, has asked for 25 more policemen for that city, the present force being 82.

The steamship Corwin will leave Seattle for Nome on May 12, this to be the first ship to start north this year.

Michael Reis, a laborer, was killed by a robber on a Northern Pacific train near Columbus, Mont., Thursday. The robber escaped.

A Portuguese tramp believed to be implicated in the Southern Pacific hold-up, in which Messenger O'Neill was murdered, has been captured at Ashland.

Andrew Sorenson, a laborer, has sued the Oregon Water Power Company, of Portland, for \$25,000 for the loss of a leg while in the employ of the company.

A crippled man attempted suicide in Albina, Thursday, expressing his desire to be out of his misery. He has but one leg and is unable to make a living without begging.

The Salvation Army in Portland has started garbage wagons for the purpose of gathering up all the waste paper in the streets, which will be baled and sold to the paper mills.

Joseph L. Barber, of Portland; R. K. Obertueffer, of Mt. Tabor, and Frank P. Gown, of Burns, are trying for the appointment as midshipman in the United States navy, in a civil service examination at Portland this week.

Passenger and freight rates between Portland and Tillamook have been restored to the old prices prevailing before the rate war. Fare is \$5 and freight rates \$5 per ton again. These prices were reduced by half during the war.

## BOUND TOGETHER

STILLMAN WOULDN'T STAY WATERBOUND.

From Huntington to Pendleton Via Ogden, Sacramento and Portland—Seven Days Continuous Traveling—Has Brought Suit to Recover Money Paid Out for Victoria Island Purchase.

A. D. Stillman returned yesterday from an extended trip to California and Denver. On this trip Mr. Stillman had quite an experience in the traveling line.

He left here some time ago for California on private business and went from there to Denver on business connected with the Woodmen of the World. Having finished in Denver he started home over the Oregon Short Line and reached Huntington the day after the washout. Not being able to reach home from that end of the line he went back to Ogden and around over the southern route by way of Sacramento and San Francisco, from there to Portland, and from there home. He was on the cars continuously from last Thursday until this morning.

While in California Mr. Stillman filed suit in the superior court seeking to recover the payment of notes owing to Walter M. Pierce as the purchaser of Victoria Island, and amounting to \$29,550. John Herd, who was at one time the virtual owner of the island, is named as the defendant.

The plaintiff alleges that the old company formerly owning the island is insolvent and that all of the property which they possess is mortgaged or otherwise encumbered for its full value, and he avers that if the notes which he holds are not redeemed in the manner suggested, he will not be able to get payment. He therefore asks for judgment in the amount named, and for a final accounting between the parties.

#### ONE ON CUNNINGHAM.

Irate Herder Takes Snap Judgment on the "Sheep King."

Sheepherders are notoriously quick to shoot and the sheepmen have hard times in handling many of them when any slight difference arises. Their lonely life makes them erratic and often they are dangerous to trifle with. In this connection a good story is told on Charles Cunningham (illustrative of the way he handles his men when he is called upon).

About a week ago Cunningham had some difficulty with one of his men who stated that he would quit and do it suddenly and demanded his wages on the spot.

Cunningham told him that he would have to wait until he could get another man to take charge of the band he was tending, but the herder would not see it that way. He drew a big gun on the "sheep king" looked along the barrel with one eye shut and stated that if the man of many fleeces did not put up the cash " pronto" that he would have his brains blown all over the range.

Cunningham has a way of dropping into the brogue when he is out of his ordinary calm, and he came to the conclusion that this was no time to talk English. He held up his hands in a soothing way and began to talk Irish.

"Sit yez down, me man," he said persuasively, "sit yez down on the ground while I talk. If yez be cam I'll draw yez a check." Then he turned to one of his men. "Hitc up the tame," he said, "hitc up the tame, while I bring the gintleman to town 't' th' bank."

Cunningham is still alive and unpunctured.

#### REVENUE FROM INDIANS.

One Hundred Fifty Drunks and Disorders in the Past Year.

The Indians are a prolific source of income to the city in the way of fines. The brave has a great desire for whiskey, and generally winds up in the city jail after he has had a few smilies. He pays his fine the next morning and goes his way until the headache is passed, when he comes into town and makes another contribution.

The records at the recorder's office show that during the past year about 150 Indians have been arrested for being drunk and disorderly in town. Out of that number 95 have paid their fines, bringing into the city the sum of \$553.25, while 51 have served jail sentences, and two have been discharged.

During the fall months, just after the harvest, when all of the Indian land owners have been paid their rent, the city reaps its greatest harvest and in the months of April and May the fewest number visit at the city jail.
