### CHURCH 200 YEARS OLD.

#### Episcopal Church Was Founded in 1704 on Long Island.

New York, April 23.—Episcopalians of New York and vicinity are deeply interested just now in the 200th anniversary of St. George's Episcopal church at Hempstead, L. I. A two days' celebration of the anniversary was begun today with Bishops Potter and Burgess and a number of other distinguished churchmen among the participants.

Long before an Episcopal church was built in Brooklyn, King George II had granted a royal charter to St. George's at Hempstead. This was in 1735, but the Quaker and Presbyterian settlers had built a church on the present site of St. George's in 1648, which remained an independent organization until 1704, when it passed under the control of the Church of England, and became an Episcopal parish.

Few churches in America have a more interesting history than the old Hempstead church, which is built of hewn logs brought from the forests on the north shore of Long Island. Among its other claims to distinction is the fact that the Hempstead church parish furnished the first American bishop, the Rev. Samuel Seabury, who was consecrated in 1784.

### Fast Service to Southwest.

St. Louis, April 23.—The Missouri, Kansas & Texas road will tomorrow inaugurate its new fast train service between this city and Southwestern points. ## "INCUBATOR" BABY

### LOLITA ARMOUR TO VISIT DR. LORENZ AT VIENNA.

Little Millionaire Cripple's Remarkable History and Her Recovery From Congenital Hip Trouble Through "Bloodless" Surgery of the Renowned Austrian Surgeon—Physicians Jealous of Dr. Lorenz' Achievement.

New York, April 23.—Lolita Armour, heiress to \$25,000,000, one of the richest children in the United States, the Chicago "incubator baby" whose cure of congenital dislocation of the hip gave widespread publicity to the "bloodless surgery" of Dr. Adolph Lorenz of Austria, with Mr. and Mrs. J. Oden Armour sailed today on the big liner Kaiser Wilhelm II for Bremen. This is the first time the child has been so far from home. She goes to visit Dr. Lorenz in Vienna.

Lolita Armour was operated on by the great Viennese surgeon in Chicago in October, 1902. For this operation almost \$30,000 was spent, and Dr. Lorenz's fee alone was \$20,000.

From the time that Lorenz first pressed the dislocation into place the child improved apparently. He returned to Chicago to replace the heavy plaster cast with a lighter one and when the cast was removed finally the child walked without pain.

Lolita has been delicate since her birth, and she is an only child. When born she weighed only three pounds, and her first fortnight was spent in a rosewood and beveled glass incubator. The efforts of her parents to restore their darling to normal health have been unceasing. Her father says it is the child's grit alone that has saved her life. She has endured two operations.

Under the direct supervision of Dr. Lorenz, Lolita will be put through a course of physical exercises which, it is expected, will mend the slight halt that is alone left of her severe trouble.

The Armours insist that the Lorenz operation was an unqualified success, and that their trip to Vienna does not indicate that their child is not cured.

Still, this bears out the attack made by Dr. John Ridlon of Chicago, who denounced the Lorenz bloodless surgery as a "delusion." He said the Armour operation was not a success, and the child's leg was too short.

Dr. Ridlon also said that only 10 per cent of Lorenz's operations in this country were cures, and that 50 per cent were flat failures.
