Fixing Salaries in Idaho. The county commissioners yesterday completed the work of the April term and adjourned to meet on June 2, at which time the contract will be definitely closed with Henry Zirbel for the improvement work on the Culebasac grade.

The board yesterday fixed the salaries of all county officers except that of the county attorney, as required by law. These salaries will take effect on January 1st. The only change made from the present salaries was in the case of the county school superintendent.

A Bluff on Spokane Shippers.

Are the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific directing a gigantic bluff against the Spokane Shippers' Association by threatening to establish here rival houses to the firms active in the shippers' movement?

Power Company Files Mortgage. For the purpose of securing money to be used in the construction of the Washington & Oregon Power Company's electrical power plant and pay for property acquired and to be acquired and for other corporate purposes of the company, there was filed in the county auditor's office today a mortgage from the company to the Baker Loan & Investment Co.

The mortgage recites that the company is empowered to issue notes not to exceed the sum of \$250,000 for the purposes above enumerated, to date from April 1, 1904, and be due and payable April 1, 1905. The privilege is reserved to pay the notes any time after September 1, 1904.

The instrument is a voluminous document, being composed of 26 closely typewritten pages of the regular legal form of paper. It contains 1,500 words and the recording fee amounted to \$11.50.—Walla Walla Statesman.

Snake River Road.

The much talked of railroad down the Snake river from Huntington to Lewiston is once more one of the leading topics of conversation, and it now seems that it will really be built and that work will begin soon.

Within two or three weeks Engineer Uter expects to have about five surveying parties along the entire route from Huntington to Lewiston, according to the Weiser Signal. He is now in the field personally supervising the work.

The line followed is about the same as the one followed by the old Northwestern company, as it is thought the new company has secured control of the old right of way.—Baker City Herald.

DEMOCRATIC HOPES.

Captain Sam White Thinks Prospects Are Bright This Year. Sam White, of Baker City, chairman of the democratic state central committee, who managed the campaign two years ago which elected George E. Chamberlain governor, was in the city a few moments last evening on his way home from Portland.

"I am astonished to note the growth of Pendleton," remarked Mr. White, as he surveyed the towering Bowman building from the O. R. & N. platform.

"I remember 12 years ago that there was scarcely a building from Main street bridge north to the Columbia river, and now I see almost a million dollars' worth of elegant homes north of the river, where the boys used to be afraid to go after dark, because of the imagined 'spooks' around the old cemetery. It is marvelous to think of the growth."

The conversation naturally turned to politics.

"I think the democratic convention did exactly the proper thing in declining to instruct for Hearst," said

Mr. White. "It is undemocratic to tie a man's hands. It is not one of the ideals of the party to put gag rule and gag law into execution. Every democratic delegate should be free to act for the best interest of the party."

"With aggressive work this year, there is every hope for the democrats of Oregon. The utter failure of the republican legislature to pass a fair salary law; the refusal of the republican convention to adopt the direct primary amendment and the almost criminal delay of the republican congress in relieving Eastern Oregon by building the ship canal in the lifetime of the present generation, all make democratic hopes brighter."

"The administration of Governor Chamberlain pleases the people. If he had a democratic legislature to work with him in his high ideals of state government, taxes would be reduced in Oregon the appropriations would be cut down within the limits of strict economy and the people would feel the results of such an administration in dollars and cents."
